War Workers Must Come From "Luxury" Industries

So Says James H. Collins in Sunday's Public Ledger

> OR some time manufacturers who received war orders would rob other factories around them of their help by offering higher wages. Then, when the competing factories needed extra help, they would raise their wages to get the men they needed. Men continually shifted from one place to another, and wages soon rose beyond reason, making it difficult to secure workers willing to stay in one position long enough to be trained properly. When war was declared many more men went into the army and navy or into munitions work and the building of cantonments. Thus a big shortage of labor has been created.

> This situation is the same all over the United States today, and, as our gigantic industrial resources are swung from a peace basis to war needs, it is certain to become worse.
