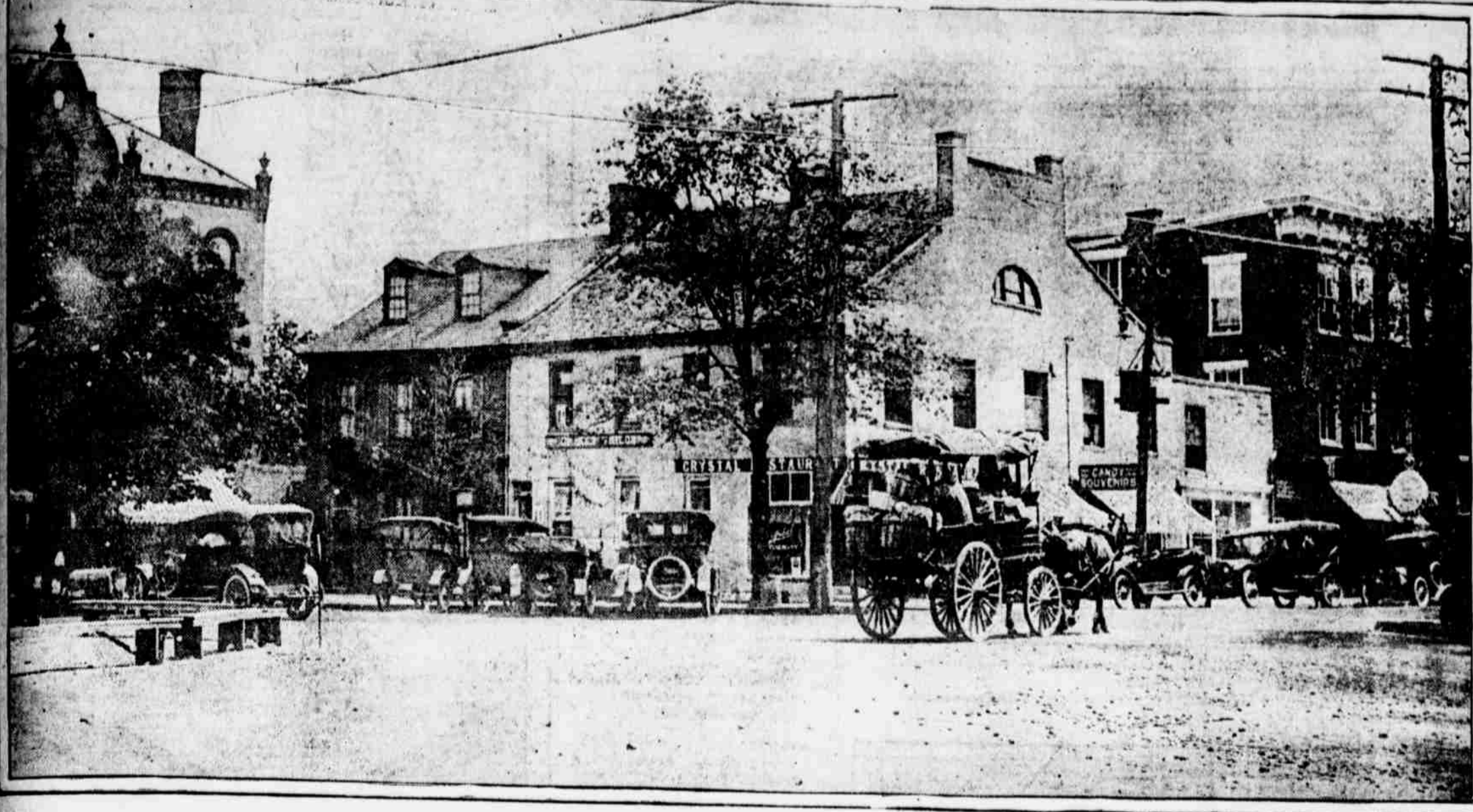


WAR-IMMORTALIZED GETTYSBURG NOW VIBRATES WITH THE PROSPERITY OF PEACE

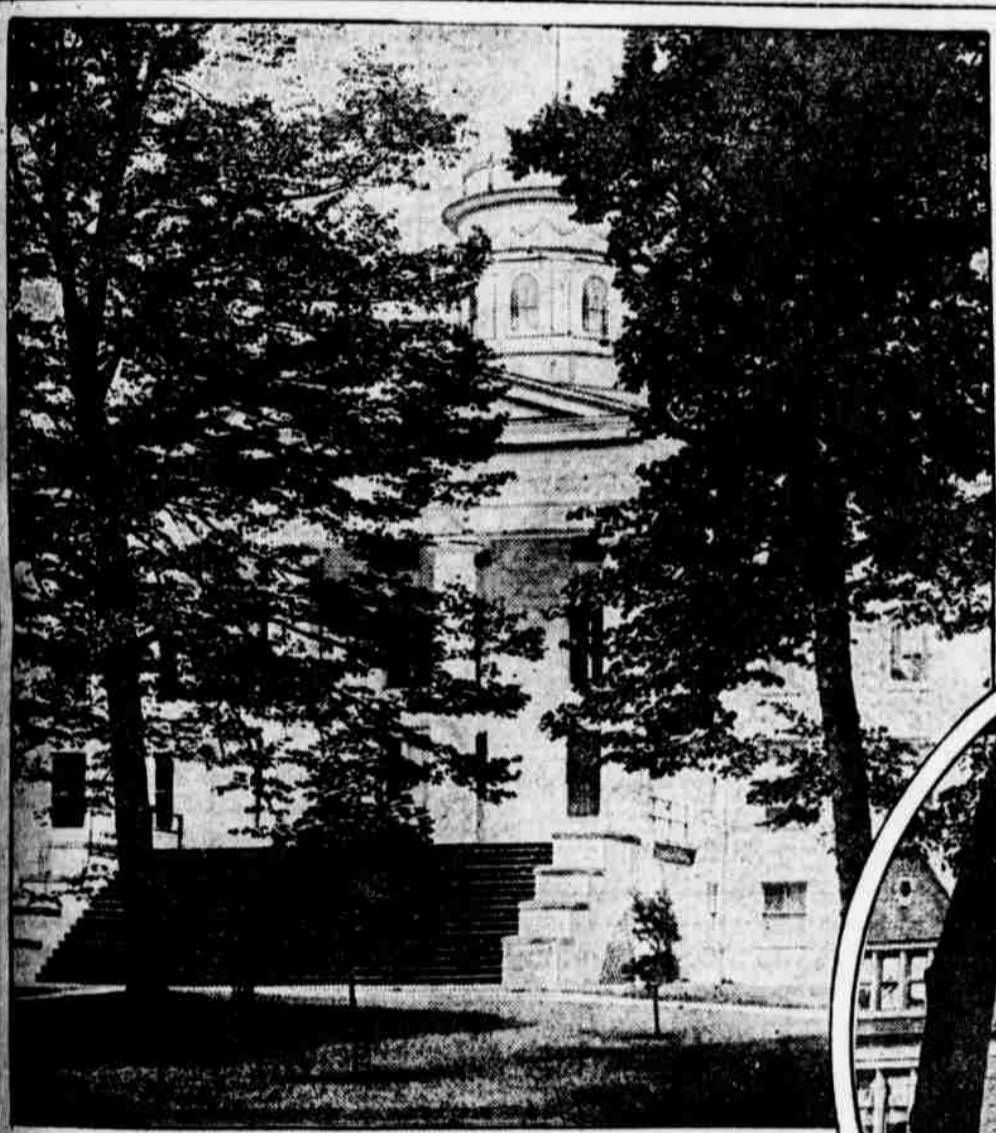

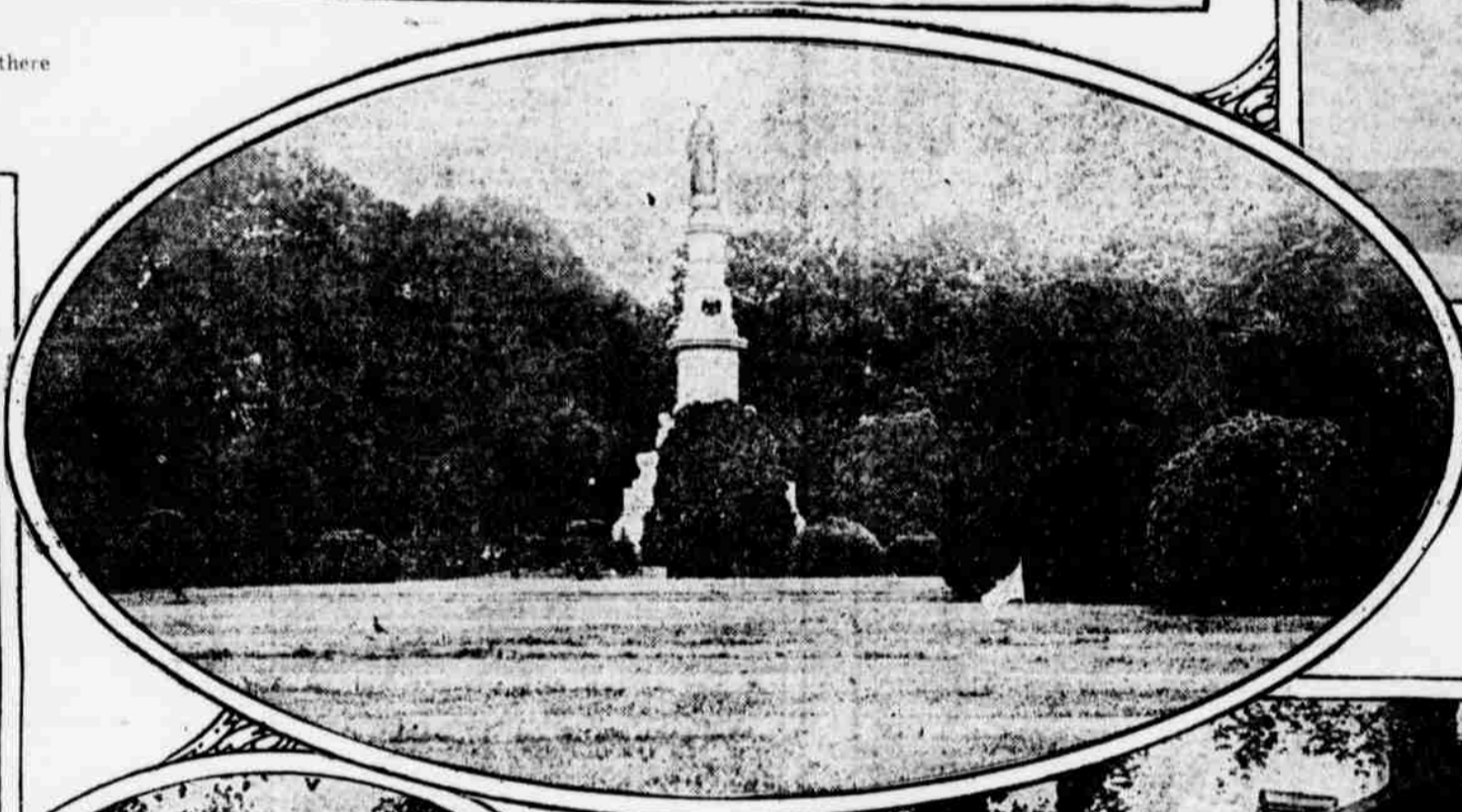
CENTER SQUARE STILL RETAINS ITS QUAIN APPEARANCE

HOUSE WHERE GENERAL MEADE HAD HEADQUARTERS DURING THE BATTLE
This building, still standing, is one of the hallowed landmarks of a town that bristles with reminders of the Civil War's greatest engagement. The commander who successfully led the Union troops against Lee's invaders of Pennsylvania soil, it will be remembered, was a Pennsylvanian.
