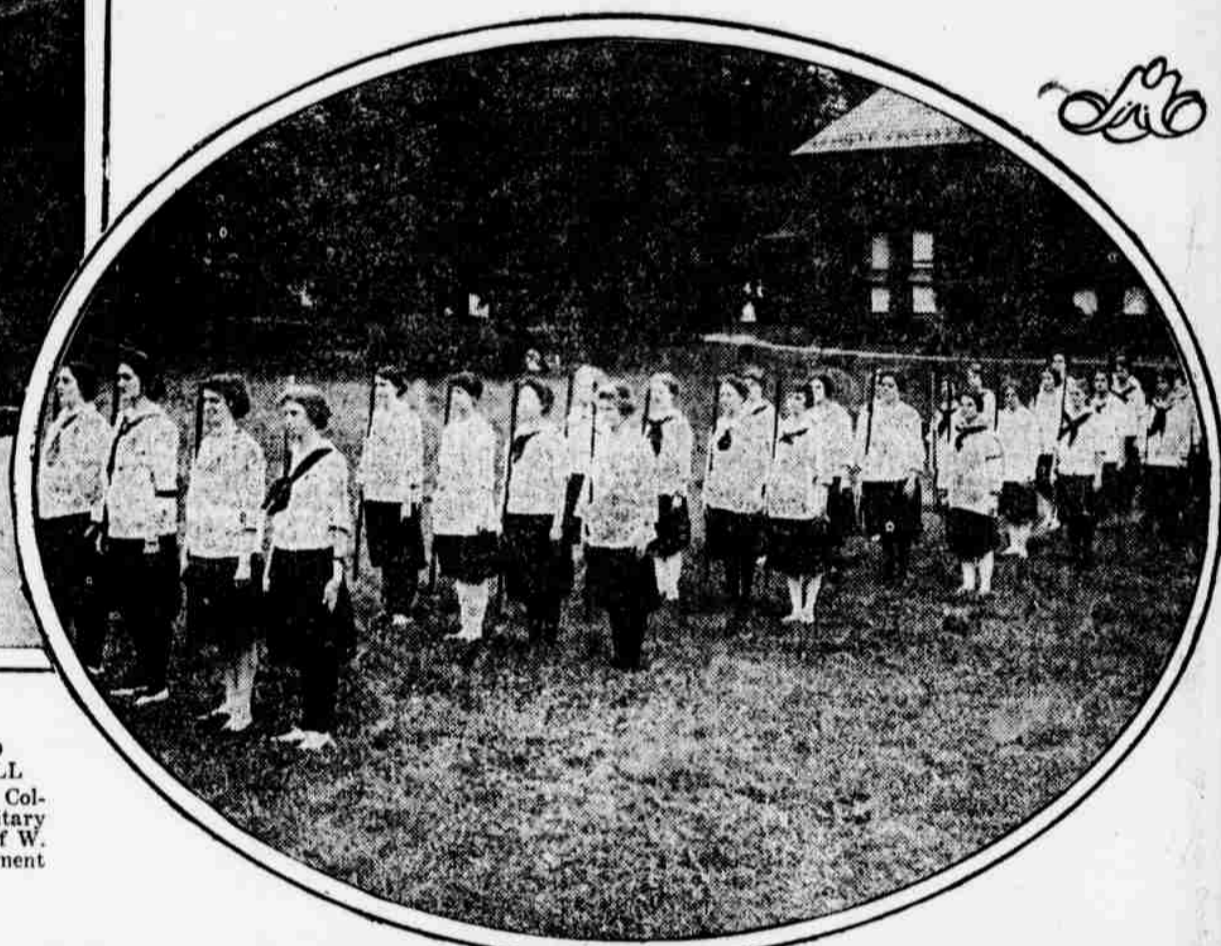
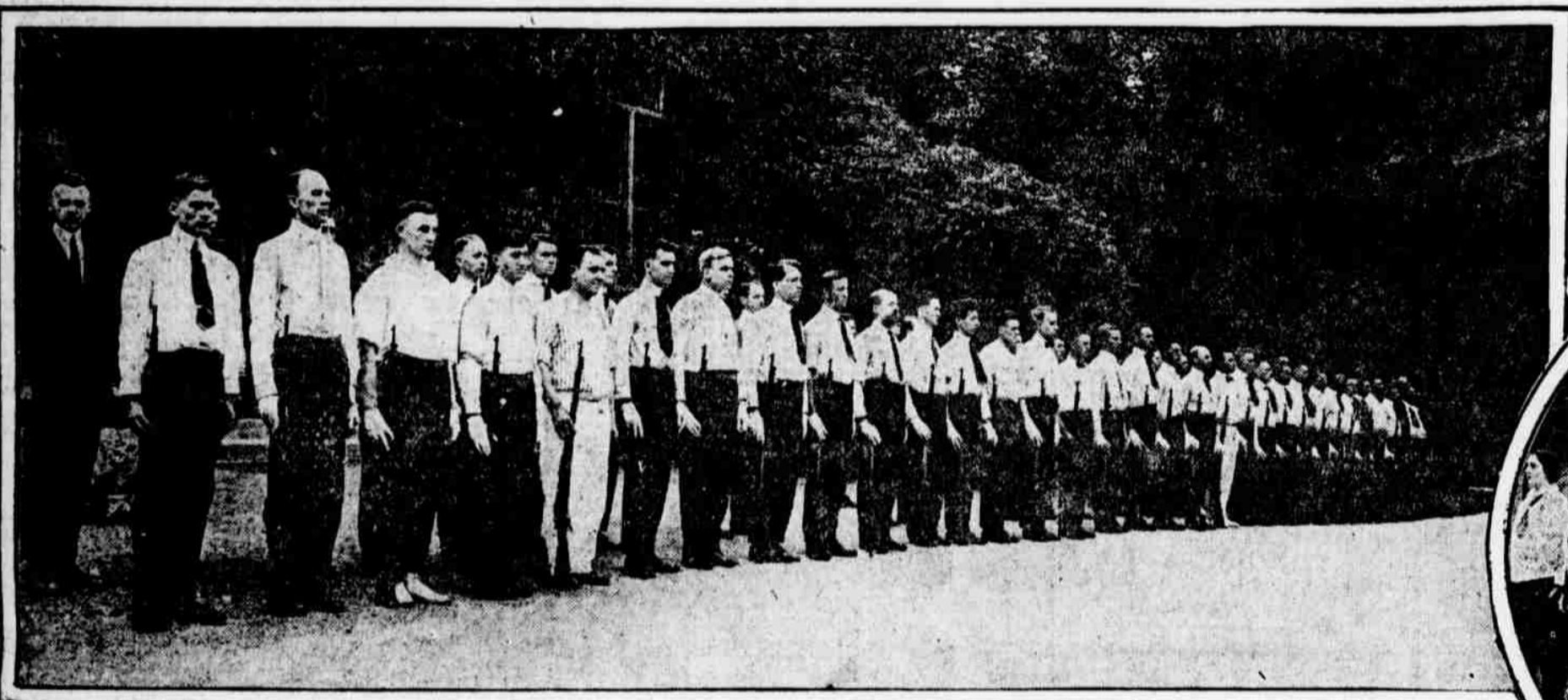

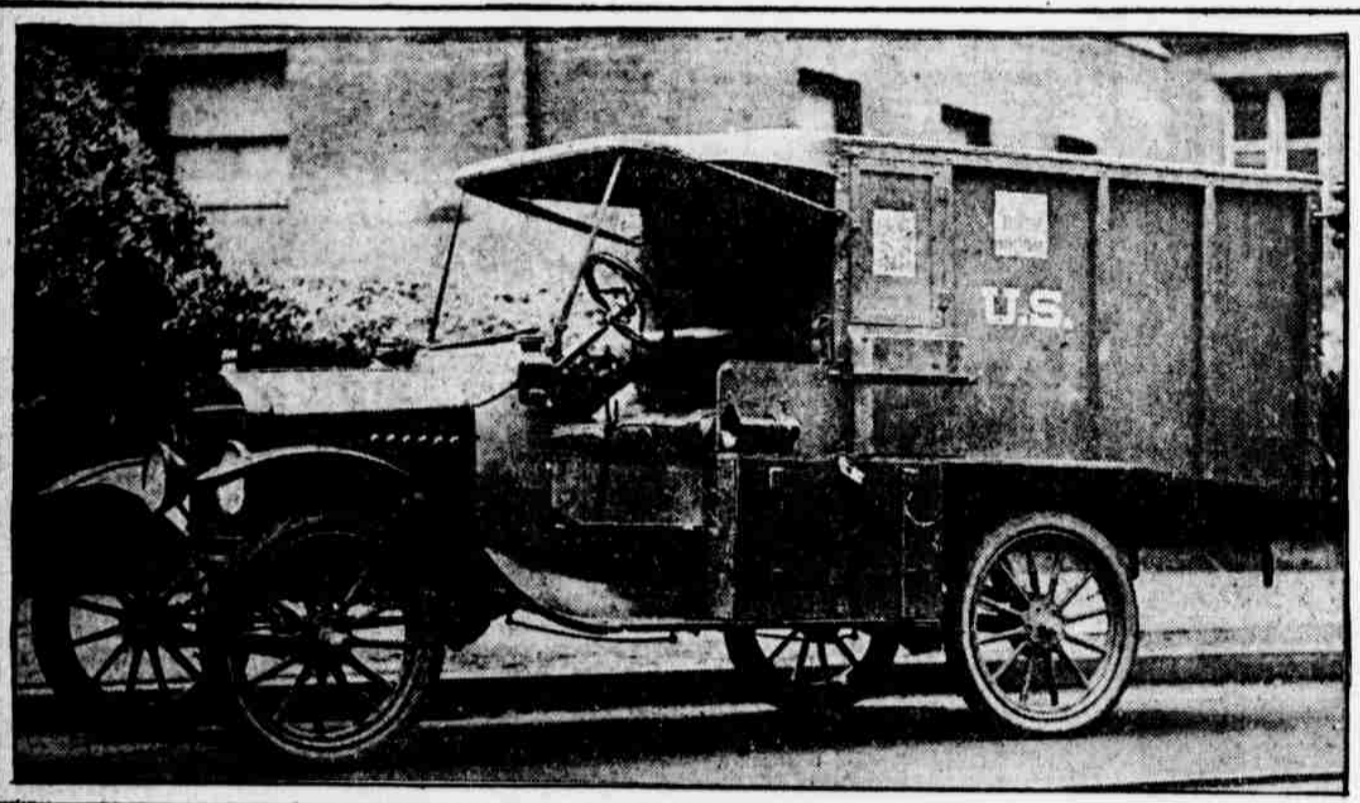
U. S. AMBULANCE RESERVE CORPS ENCAMPED NEAR PORT KENNEDY
