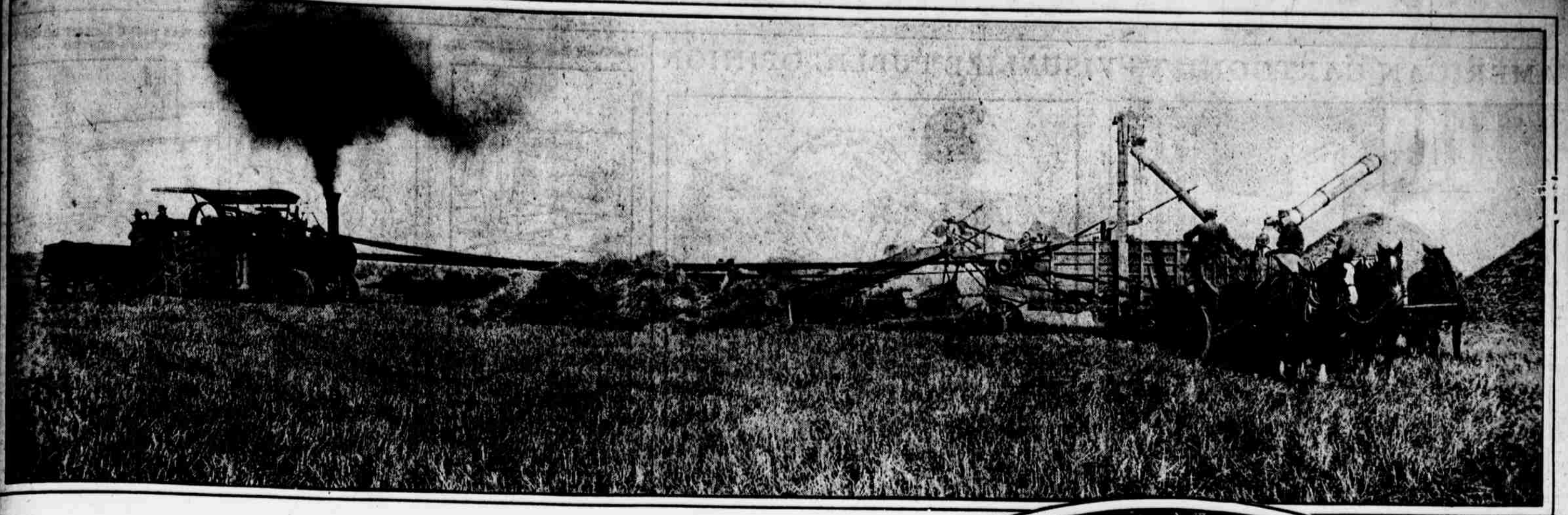
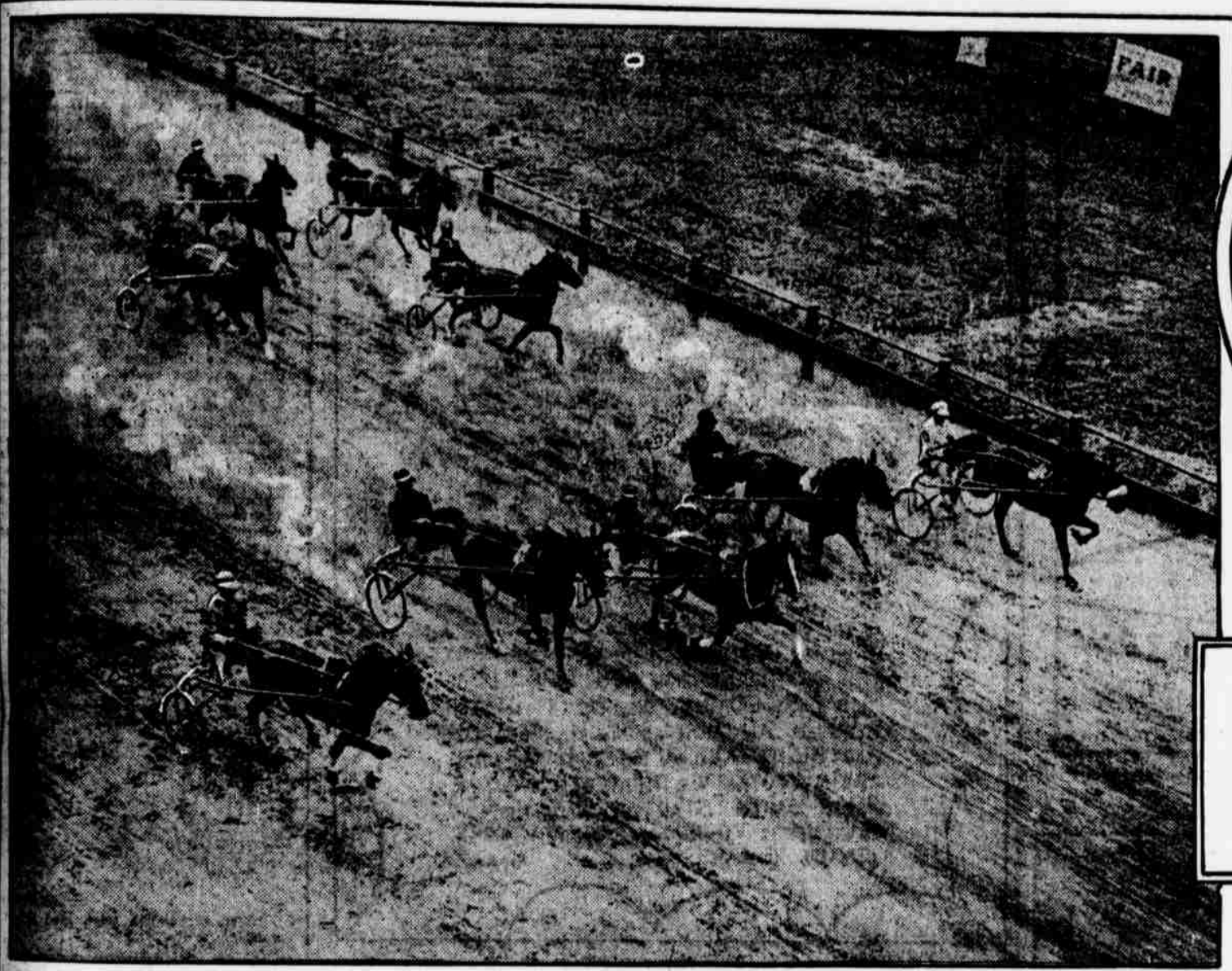


FROM WAR TO SPORT THE CAMERA RANGES IN ITS QUEST OF PICTURESQUE NEWS

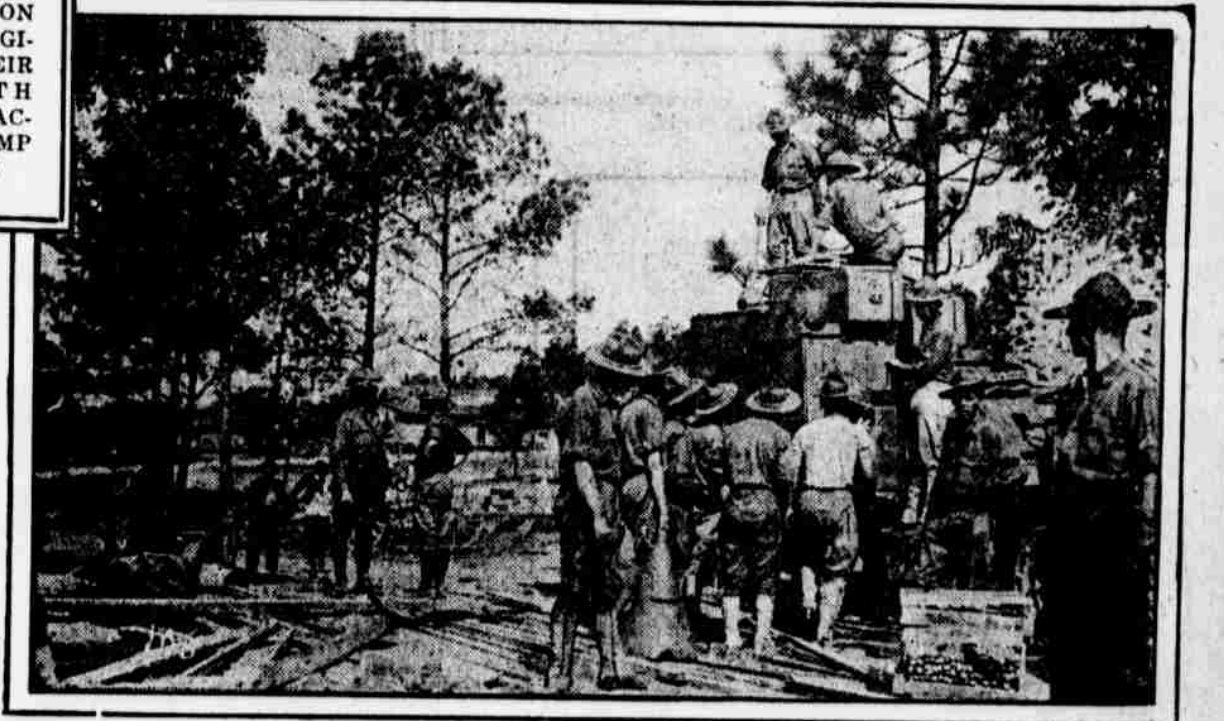


WITH THE TROTTING KINGS ON BELMONT TRACK

Lovers of speedy horseflesh have enjoyed a surfeit of pleasure in their favorite sport during the presence of the Grand Circuit meeting.

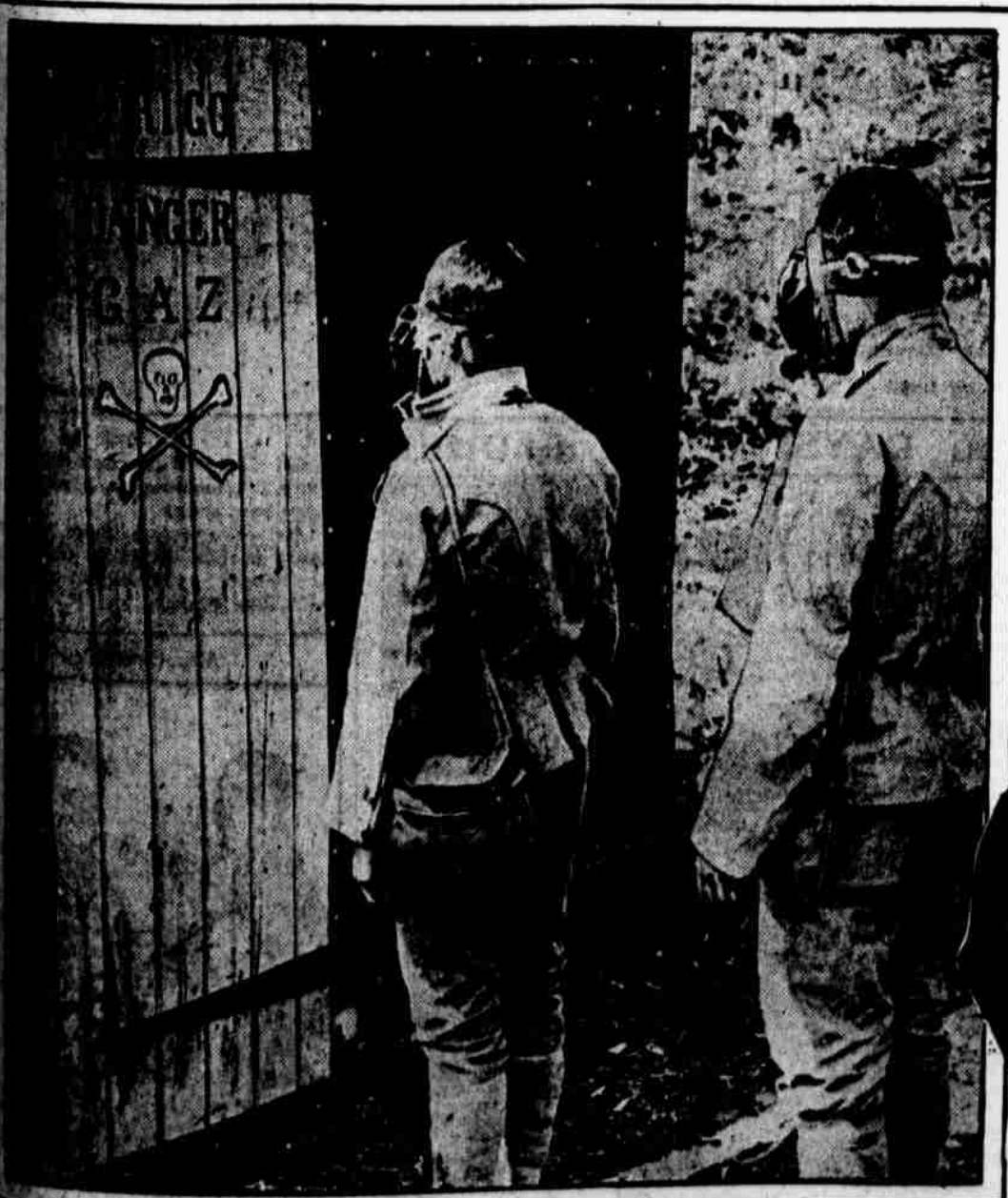
