DECIDING GAMES IN PHILADELPHIA SUBURBAN LEAGUE POSTPONED AT LAST MINUTE OWING TO BIG PARADE Montgomery County League to Wind Up Season and Jenkintown Has Opportunity to Tie Glenside for the Pennant

THE final games of the season scheduled for today in the Philadelphia Suburban League were last night postponed until next Saturday, owing to the big draft parade.

The closing matches in the Montgomery County League are scheduled, when Glenside plays at Bethayres and Jenkintown journeys to Fort Washington. A single game separates Glenside and Jenkintown and if the former loses and the latter wins the race will have ended in a tie.

It is considered that the former champions have an excellent chance with Reed pitching against Touchstone. The umpires will be Bartzel and Cooper.

Today's games in the Main Line League will have a vital bearing on the race for premier honors in that organization. The four clubs in the first division—Dun & Co., Autocar, Brandywine and Wilkes-Barre—are running for the championship.

The elimination series to determine the winner of the eastern championship of the Pennsylvania Railroad shop teams will be continued here today, when Trenton is scheduled to meet the Philadelphia team.

The series calls for home-and-home games between the teams mentioned and Baltimore, of the P. & B. division. Trenton and Baltimore played the opening game on the former's grounds on Wednesday, when the Jerseymen won by 7-0.

While Henry Dieston's nine has captured the title in the northern section of the Industrial League, its percentage may be bettered before the season is concluded.

The big affair of the second half of the Delaware County League will be the game between the Philadelphia and the Pottsville teams at Pottsville on Saturday afternoon.

The University of Pennsylvania Athletic Association, through Major Maylin J. Pickering, graduate manager, Robert C. Johnson, coach, and Henry J. Miller, captain of the varsity football team, has sent the following appeal to every man who was on last year's varsity scrub or freshman team, as well as to the men who reported for spring practice and who had never before been candidate for the team, to report for work this fall.

Major Pickering said today: "We have perfected a system for taking care of all the men who wish to play football, and we can accommodate as many as come out. We want football to lead off with such a big squad that it will show the students and the public that if there is the same interest in other sports we will have that general participation in athletics that we are looking for."

The spring practice was held in order to get out such men as had never before been candidates for the team, and the results have been most satisfactory.
