BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 20. The first Mayor of Bethlehem will be Archibald Johnston, who at the primary election held in the combined boroughs yesterday, received, unofficially, seventy-six per cent of the total vote cast. With but two precincts to hear from the vote cast was \$510. of which 2569 were received by Mr. Johnston. Dr. J. Mitchel Walters, the opposing candidate, received 421 votes. #### KEISTER AND HOVERTER IN HARRISBURG RACE

HARRISBURG, Sept. 20 .- Interference of the Brumbaugh administration in the non-partisan primary elections of Harrisburg has resulted in the nomination for Mayor of ex-Representative Daniel L. Keister. His opponent will be Alderman George A. Ho-verter, a friend of Senator E. E. Beidleman, whom William H. Ball, the Governor's private secretary, set out to defeat. Despite promises to keep "hands off," Ball, at the last minute, had distributed slips to all State employes giving the administration slate, headed by Keister, and the surprise resulted in the Beidleman forces, which had kent out of the slocal Councilmanic fight, being swept off their feet with regard to the head of the nonpartisan ticket.

W. L. Gorgas, at present acting Mayor, a Democrat, was a poor third in the mayor-alty race. Keister and Hoverter are Re-The administration tried to repeat its factics in the county race, backing Alderman E. J. Hilton against Coroner Jacob Eckinger for Coroner, but failed,

Eckinger winning out by a decisive vote.

Throughout the county and in the Republican race in the city the Beidelman slate went through by large majorities. The re-sult of the mayoralty primary will be one of the hottest in years, as it is the evident intention of the administration to attempt to unhorse Beidleman as city leader.

Barely Squeezes Through for Republican Nomination Over Ex-Senator Bennett

NEW YORK, Sept. 20. Mayor John Purroy Mitchel won the Re ublican mayoralty nomination in yester day's primaries by a plurality of approxinately 1100 votes over William M. Ben-

With only two districts missing out o 060, Mayor Mitchel's vote was 36.646 and Bennett's 25,527.

Bennett this afternoon declared he would force a recount, saying that he had been counted out" and that a fair count would show that he had been nominated.

Mayor Mitchell declared that if there was any fraud it should be exposed. Morris Hillquit was nominated by the Socialists. No estimate of the Socialist rots cast was available early this afternoon. The primary vote was generally light broughout the city, and the Mitchel vote n the Republican primaries fell below ex-sectations in most of the boroughs. Ap-serently many Fusion voters failed to go to Former Senator William H. Bennett, the straight Republican candidate for Mayor, ran well ahead of the Mayor in Kings County in the Republican ranks, but the Mitchel vote in Manhattan was suffi-ciently large to offset the Brooklyn loss and the Bennett vote in the other boroughs and give the Mayor the Republican nomination. Controller William A. Prendergast and Fire Commissioner Robert Adamson, the Fusion candidates for Controller and president of the Board of Aidermen, respectively, were both nominated over their opponents on the Bennett ticket, Judson G. 
