

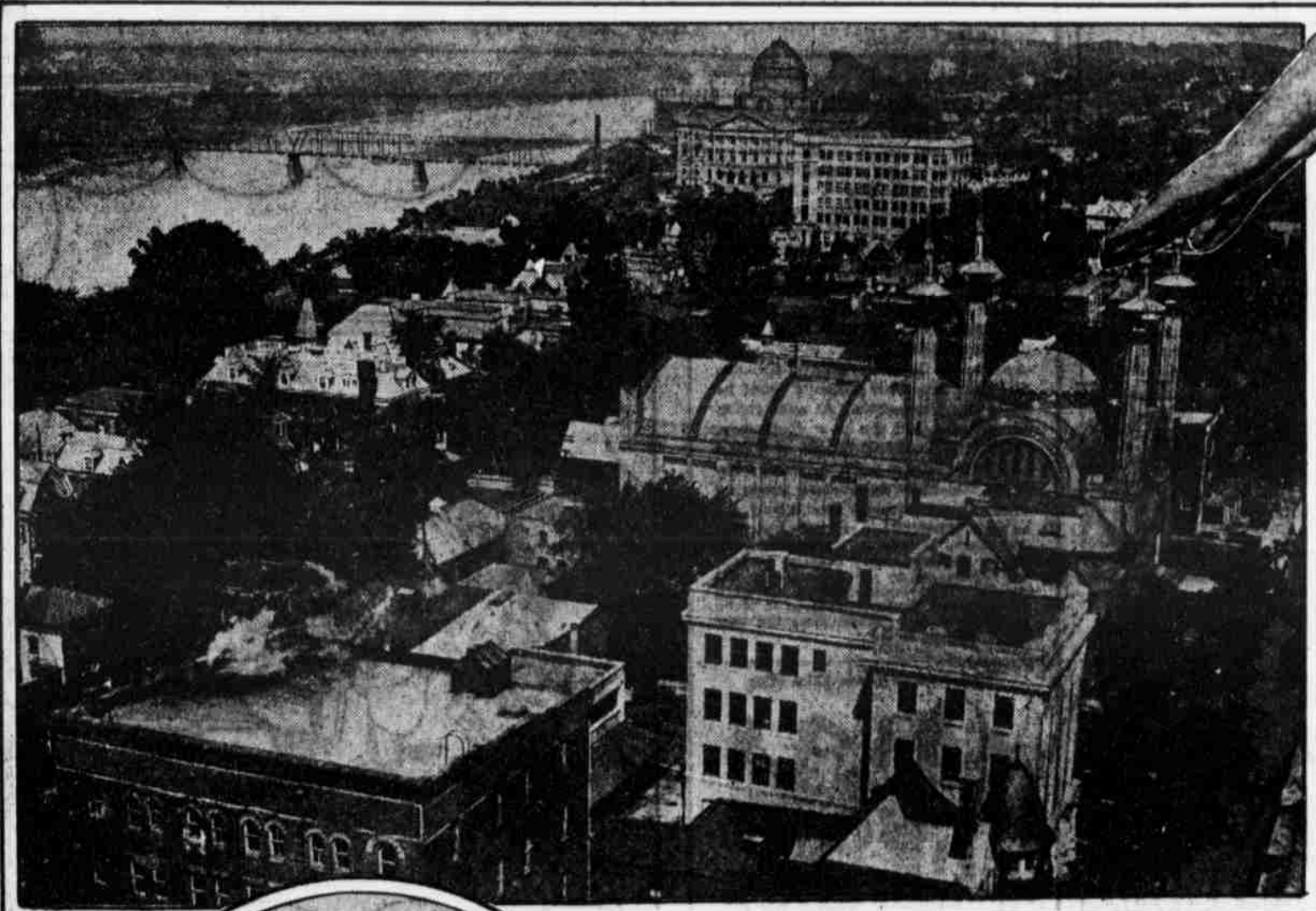

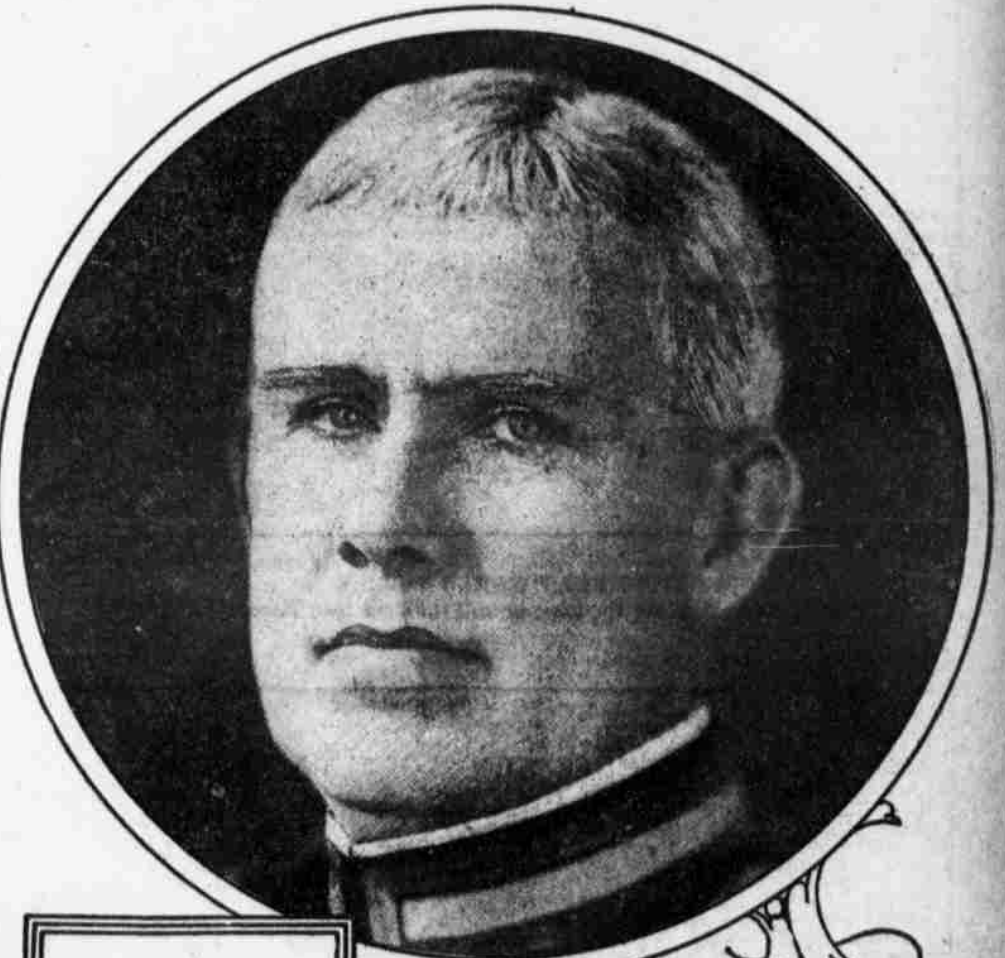

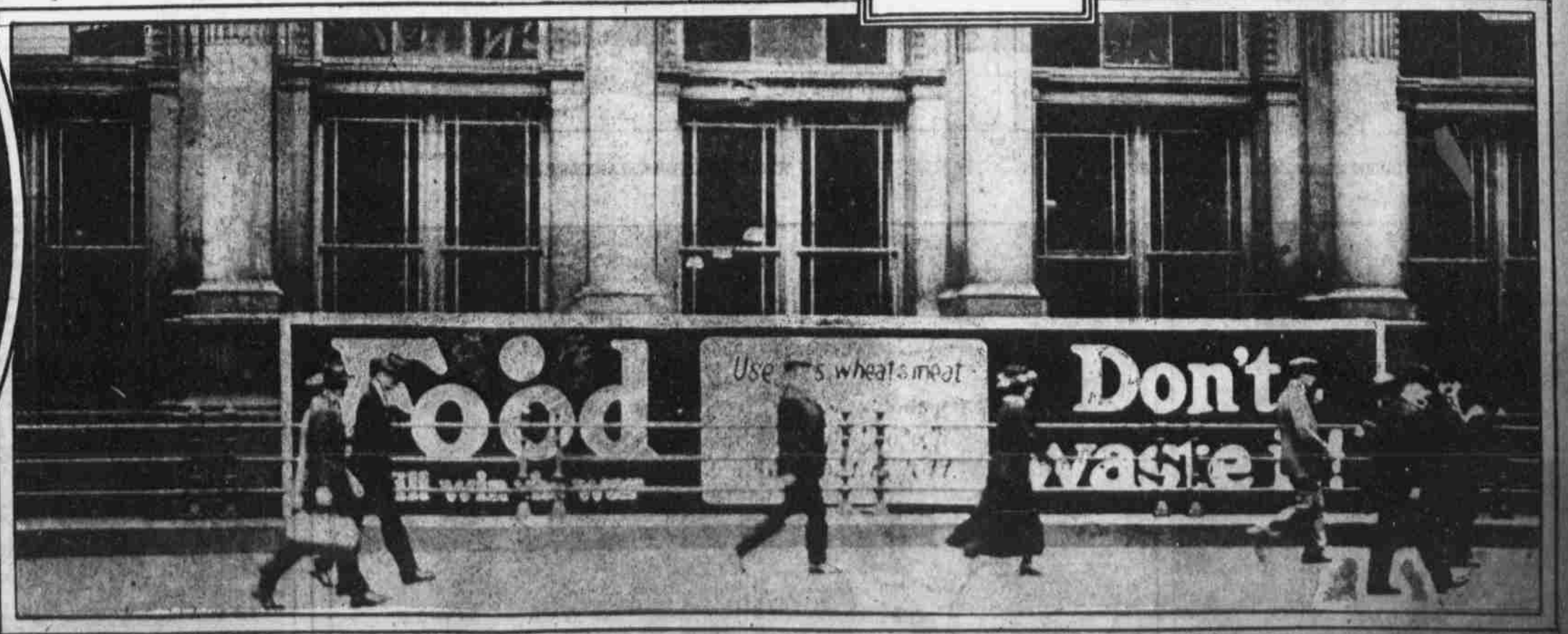


MISS MABEL ARKLIE, a fair haired of the Turngemeinde, who took part in the opening meet of the River-ton Swimming Club.
