SCHOOLS BROADEN **COURSE IN CIVICS** WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Sixteen big warehouses for the new war relief distribu-tion system have been completed abroad, according to dispatches to the American Red Cross from its commission in France. Six of the buildings are in Paris and the others in departments cutaide of the capital, and all are filled with supplies ranging from medicines, clothes and food to building ma-terials and farm implements. American college men, many of whom formerly drove ambulances at the front, are directing the system.

BIG STUDENT INTEREST

City Educators Work Out Modern System of Teaching Free From Formality

The new idea in education has come to Philadelphia public schools to stay. The out regime of iron discipline and dry studies has been displaced for all time by the march of progress. The slogan now, is "get the student's interest, and hold it."

A course in civics, designed to make good citizens of the students, was established in the six lower grades of the public schools In October, 1916. This course has proved so successful, has created such enthusiaem among the children, teachers and parents, that on November 1 it will be extended to the seventh and eighth grades, according to announcement made today by Dr. Theodore L. MacDowell, associate superintendent of schools, from his office in the Keystone Building, Ninetcenth street above Chest-

It follows closely the new idea in education. It is said to mark the first step in the installation of the most modern and advanced methods in Philadelphia public schools.

"This course in civics was instituted last years as an experiment," said boctor Mac-Dowell. "It has proved most successful. It is intended to superseds the course in civil government which in the past has been extremely formal.

"The new civics course is absolutely in formal. It is intended to gradually lead the children up from a consideration of matters which interest them to realization of the functions of government—city. State and Federal. It does away with the old formal methods of learning the Constitu-tion by heart and reciting it like a parrot. The primary function in modern education in to interest the children and to hold that interest, and, in this manner, to instruct them. This new course has been a most im-portant step along these lines. We believe it will tend to make intelligent citizens of our children."

FROM FIRST GRADE TO ENGHTH The course begins in the first grade, with onsideration of the fundamental civic virtues, morals and manners. The children are led by the teacher to make suggestions, to produce illustrations of points raised and to take a lively interest in the subject as being one that touches vitally upon the individual life. This grade deals with obedience, cleanlineas, orderliness, courtesy, helpfulness and kindness to animals.

Beginning with the first grade, the course continues directly through the other grades. The subjects considered in the various grades are:

Second grade: Punctuality, truthfulness, care of property, fair play, safety and kind-ness to animals. Third grade: Thoroughness, honesty, re-

spect, kindness to animals. Fourth grate: Courage, self-control,

thrift, perseverance, kindness to animals, and a study of the policeman, the fireman, the postman, the street cleaner, the gar-bage collector, the ash and rubbish collector.

Fifth grade: Water supply, gas, electric-ity, telephone, the neighborhood, the city beautiful, and safety first. Sixth grade: Philadelphia, its industries

and occupations, including a study of in-dustries for which Philadelphia is noted, occupations, condition of work and ethics in business.

Seventh grade: Health, protection of life and property, education, recreation and Eighth grade: Communication, trans-portation and wealth. civic beauty.


