Meeting of Camp Fire Guardians At the Business Women's Christian League on Monday afternoon the first joint meeting of the season of the executive board and board of counselors of the Camp Fire Guardians Association of Philadelphia and vicinity was held. The meeting was called to discuss plans for the work this winter.

It was decided to find out which girls are accomplished in special forms of entertaining, and from the list thus made programs will be arranged so that the Camp Fire Girls can help other organizations in their entertainments for the soldiers and sailors. Later in the fall there will be a patriotic rally, when speakers will explain the work of the Patriotic League and the Red Cross Society. The girls have been helping at the various auxiliaries near their homes.

There is a great need for a Camp Fire headquarters. The Camp Fire Guardians Association has no address, no office, no telephone, no direct way through which outside organizations and others interested in the work can get in touch with them. An office must be established downtown this winter. This is one of the most important things to be accomplished as soon as possible.

A class in cooking has been conducted one evening a week for the Camp Fire Girls. This camp proved to be so successful that every effort will be made to have a larger and better one next year. Various ways of raising money for this purpose were suggested, but it was decided not to do anything definite until after the campaign for the Liberty Loan was closed.
