SCHOOLROOM AND SHOP SCHEME IS URGED HERE

Industrial Co-operative Study Divides High School Pupils' Time Between Two Fields

MIGHT SOLVE LABOR CEISIS

"Fitchburg Plan" Where Tested Meets Approval of Boys, Parents, Manufacturers and Educators

The industrial co-operative course of study, which combines the theoretical work of the classroom with practical shop work In various industries, is being urged upon the Board of Education in this city by the committee of civilian service and labor of the Home Defense Committee, according to announcement made today by its chairman. Franklin Spencer Edmonds. This plan provides that manual training

high school boys more than sixteen years of age shall be placed in shops for a period of two weeks, and shall then spend two weeks at their regular school work. For this pur-pose the school is divided into two sections, While one section is in the shop the other is at school. When the first section has finished its two weeks' work it returns to the school and its place in the shops is taken by the second division.

THE FPICHBURG SYSTEM

The committee headed by Mr. Edmonds has made a close study of this question. The plan is known as the "Fitchburg system." having been started some years ago in Fitchburg, Mass. It was later taken t Cincinnati, Ohio, and then in York, Pa. value has been demonstrated in these places by the enthusiasm displayed by pupils, teachers, industrial concerns and parents, according to Mr. Edmonds.

The resolution as passed by the commit-tee on civilian service and labor, and as communicated to the Board of Education. in as follows:

Resolved. That the committee on civil-ian service and labor recommend to the authorities of the public, parochial and private schools of Philadelphia the trial of a plan for co-operative work and study on the part of boys more than sixteen years of age, with preference given to the boys of upper classes, so that they may be released from school for industrial work as will give also a training in all branches of a trade for a given period of time and then continue studying for an equal period of time, alternating with other groups

of boys. 'Provided, That this industrial work shall be done under the supervision of the school authorities as to the hours and conditions of employment at not less n the standard rate of wages paid by employers of organized labor for than the

such employment. In referring to the resolution, Mr. Edmonds said -


The shortage of labor in so many industrial lines which are essential to the sucseful conduct of the war has caused consideration to be given to what is known as the Fitchburg plan. In several places in this country an attempt has been made to work out a co-operative plan of study and employment for the older schoolboys.

"The net result is to give the family some income from the boys' labor and yet to evable the boy to continue his education. Moreover, in many technical lines it is found that the boy takes hold of his studies with an added nest when he has seen the application of his studies in the shop. In this way the shop work has an important educational hearing. For instance, in shipfilding, where there is a great demand r labor today, the boy who has workev in the shop for some time will come back to his mechanical drawing, geometry, efc. with a fresh rest and in many cases will accomplish as much as he would even though the time devoted to shop work had


