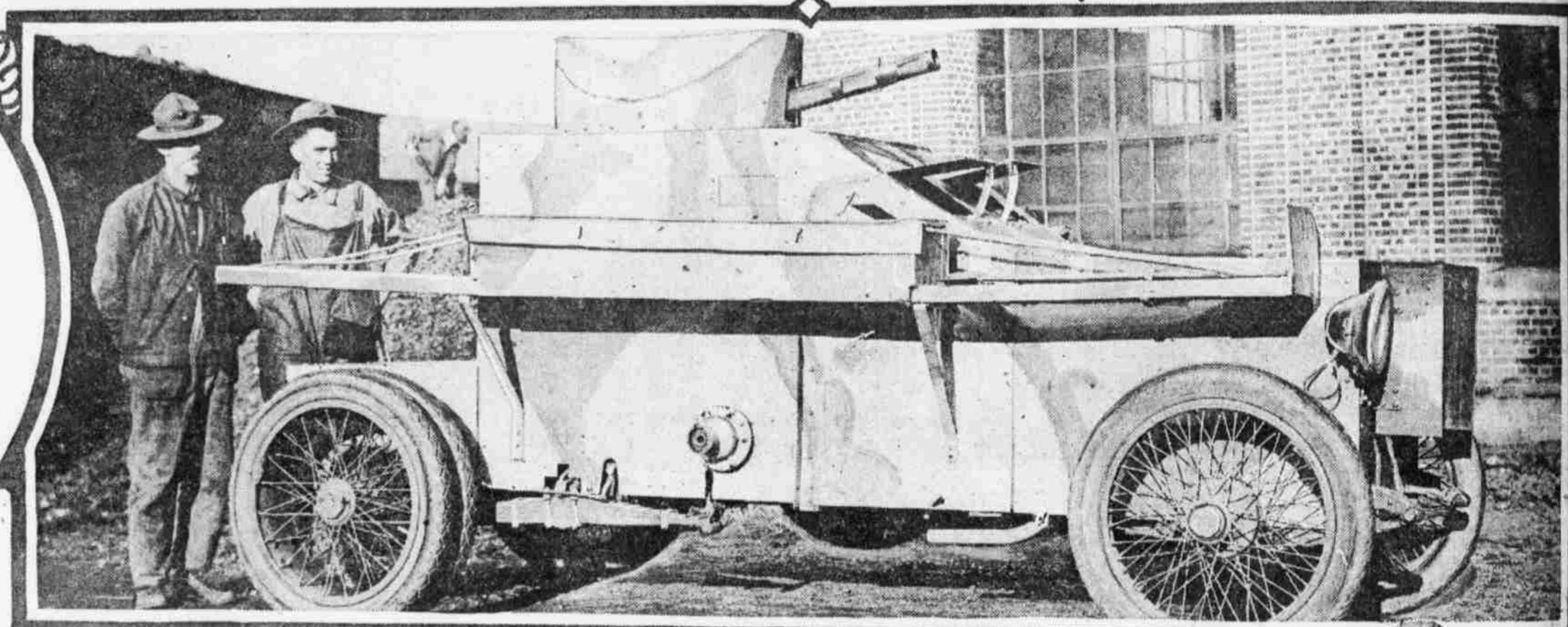
MILITARY SERVICE IN THIS WAR IS BY NO MEANS RESTRICTED TO MEMBERS OF THE STERNER SEX

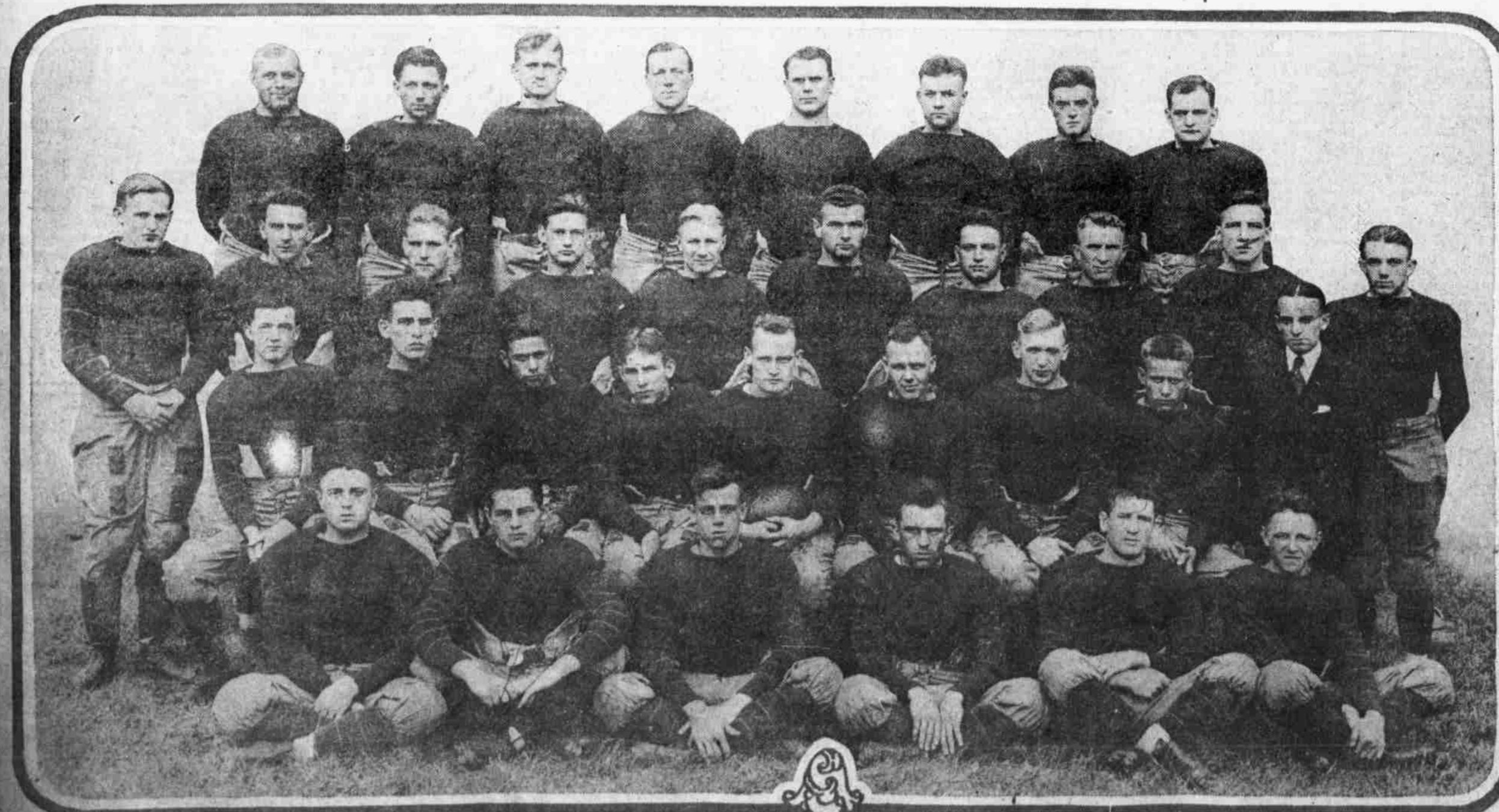
HARRY LAUDER RENDERS "FIRST AID" TO A WOUNDED BRITISH SOLDIER
