Low-hanging clouds and a heavy mist have caused slackening in the artillery activity on both sides. At the same time this same condition has permitted working parties to repair the damage caused by

parties to repair the damage caused by previous artillery fire without much danger. The weather has been such that the fiers

have not been active.

The reports to headquarters indicate that there has been no departure from the normal activities in the trenches.

SEES SIGNS OF GERMAN CHANCELLOR'S FAILURE

Second Batch of Americans on The Tageblatt Warns of Internal Dissension-Admits Danger of Majority Break

"His fundamental ideas on a parliamentary system remain untried," says the Tageblatt. It adds that the Conservatives attitude of reserve regarding Von Hertling's foreign policy is a sign that there will be a split on other lesues.

The Tageblatt admits there is danger of the present majority party breaking up in the Reichstag, when the Centrists would surely follow the "Centrist Chancellor" in the party interest.
