

NEW JERSEY VOTES FOR LOCAL OPTION

Enough Pledged Assemblymen Elected to Insure Passage of Law

SWEEP FOR REPUBLICANS

TRENTON, Nov. 7. Local option won at the election in Jersey yesterday. Enough Assemblymen pledged to local option were elected to insure its passage by the Legislature without difficulty.

The Republicans made a clean sweep except in such counties as Hudson, Hunterdon and Warren, which only a miracle could take from the Democratic ranks, returns showed today. In the other eighteen counties the Republicans elected forty-six Assemblymen, a majority of their local option advocates. Twelve Democrats were chosen in Hudson and one each in Warren and Hunterdon.

Eight Senators were elected, six Republicans and two Democrats. With those who hold over, the Senate will stand fifteen Republicans and six Democrats. Not since before Governor Wilson's time has the Democratic party had such a small representation in both houses of the State Legislature.

Essex County, which includes Newark, was looked to as the savior of the Democracy, but this hope failed when the returns from the suburbs, Montclair and came in from the suburbs. Montclair and Essex came down with huge pluralities and swept away the 6000 plurality the Democrats had piled up in the city.

REPUBLICANS WIN IN GLOUCESTER CITY

The Republicans were successful at the polls in Gloucester City yesterday. The returns, as compiled by City Clerk Johnson, showed that they elected all of their municipal candidates with the exception of a member of City Council and Justice of the peace. They also gave the county ticket a majority with the exception of Sheriff. The vote was very heavy and much cutting was done on both sides.

ASBURY PARK DEFEATS LOCAL OPTION NOMINEE

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Nov. 7. While Monmouth County elected two local option Assemblymen yesterday, Asbury Park voted for license, 530 to 539. Senator Henry E. R. Ackerson was elected over Charles R. Snyder, Republican, who was pledged to local option.

Minority Leader Elmer H. Geran, of the State Assembly, who based his campaign on enforcement of the excise laws, defeated John W. Flock, Republican, for Sheriff, T. Lloyd Lewis and D. G. Young, Republicans, defeated B. V. Poland and F. I. Smith, Democrats, for Assembly.

The local license vote is the first step in a campaign for the repeal of the law preventing the sale of liquor within a mile of camp-meeting grounds. It will be opposed by the Ocean Grove Association.

Virginia Overwhelmingly Democratic

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 7.—Democrats elected the entire State ticket by a majority of more than 30,000 yesterday in a vote abnormally light. The Republicans made the poorest showing for years, losing three members of the lower branch of the General Assembly on joint ballot. The Democrats will have 123 and Republicans 17.

FUSION TICKET IS LOST IN CAMDEN

Republican Voters "Snow Under" Their Opponents in City and County

SHERIFF HAINES WINNER

The Independent-Fusion candidates for office in Camden city and county were completely snowed under, according to the official returns this morning. The Republicans captured the Excise Commission in Camden city by a plurality of more than 4000 votes over the nonpartisan "No License ticket," the Democratic candidates running third.

Sheriff Joshua C. Haines, Republican candidate for State Senator, led the ticket. In Camden city he received 10,634 votes to 2532 cast for Wilford B. Wolcott, the Independent-Fusion candidate. His majority in the county was nearly 12,000, with four districts to be heard from.

Assemblyman Charles B. Wolverson took second honors in the point of votes received. Both Haines and Wolverson are committed to local option and had the support of the church element.

Camden gave W. Penn Corson 9815 votes, against 2949 for Duncan W. Blake, the Independent fusion candidate for Sheriff. Blake made a better showing in the county, however, receiving 5710 votes, to 15,063 for Corson, with four districts to be heard from. Blake's best showing was in Gloucester City, his home town.

Harry Reeves was re-elected Surrogate over ex-Sheriff Joseph Nowrey. Reeves received 8225 votes in the city and 14,445 votes in the county, as against 2463 and 6697, respectively, for Nowrey. The fusionists had pinned their hopes on Nowrey, who made the best showing.

Ralph N. Kellum and Dr. Paul N. Litchfield were elected to the Assembly by substantial majorities.

Freelander, councilman and Justice of the Peace berths went to the Republicans in Camden. In the Twelfth Ward, Councilman Abbott was re-elected after a hard fight by a majority of seventy-one votes. Abbott received 660 votes to 583 cast for King, the fusion candidate. Councilman Sylvester Corson also won out in the Tenth Ward. His majority was 214 over the Democratic candidate. Edwards, the "Square Deal Republican" was a bad third.
