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SEEK MYSTERIOUS MAN IN CLEVELAND TRAGEDY

Clue Found to Identity of Slayer of Prominent Author-Physician

CLEVELAND, Nov. 9. General orders to all police went out to day to arrest a man known to have been n Cleveland yesterday afternoon at the time Dr. Harry L. Chapin, physician, auther and world-wide traveler, was murdered at the Colonial Hotel. Chapin late vesterday afternoon was called to the room of a man who registered at the hotel in the morning. At 5 o'clock last evening a mald discovered Doctor Chapin in a pool of blood on the floor of the room the stranger secupied. He died in a few minutes, his ips moving as if he wished to explain, but is efforts failing.

His skull was crushed from a blow dealt rom behind. An empty travelling bag was n the room, but nothing else to give the

Doctor Chapin carried several hundred

dollars and jewelry, in all totaling about \$1500. This was untouched.

Mrs. Chapin, who was the widow of Valentine Fries, wealthy Sandusky boat owner and lumberman, before she married "the blind doctor," as Chapin was named. The blind doctor, as Chapin was named, said her husband had been called on the telephone early in the afternoon. He had gone to see a man at the Colonial. A maid heard two men quarreling in the room where the crime was committed.
