

MORE THAN \$30,000 IN ARMENIAN FUND

Two-Day Campaign Ended Last Night With Collections in Churches

OTHER CITY NEWS BRIEFS

Thursday Will Be Last Day to Mail Christmas Gifts to Soldiers and Sailors

More than \$30,000 was collected in the two-day campaign for the relief of Armenia war sufferers ending last night, it was announced today. The exact total has not been determined.

The campaign, which closed with contributions from churches last night, was aided by the Armenian committee of the Emergency Aid, headed by Mrs. George Horsey Lorimer. Fifty young women under the direction canvassed Germantown. Armenian and Syrian volunteers made a thorough street campaign. The results were very satisfactory, according to N. Goldstein, secretary of the Philadelphia committee for Armenian relief, who said that there are more than 400,000 destitute orphans in the Bible lands.

Mail Army Xmas Gifts Thursday

Members of the American Red Cross are working at top speed to supply the 90,000 additional Christmas packages for soldiers and sailors that must be mailed not later than November 15. 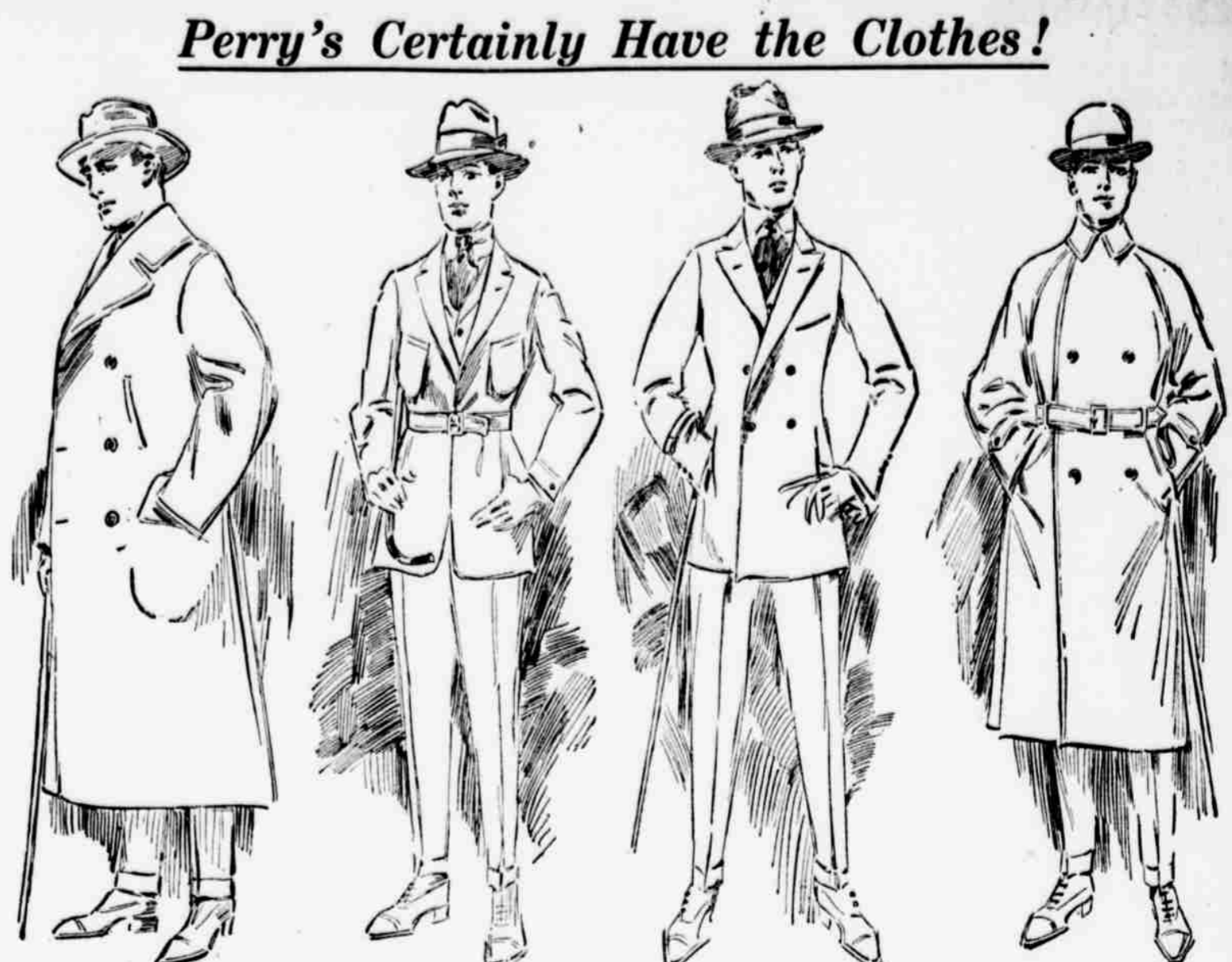
FIRST HONOR MEDAL GOES TO OHIO MAN

Patrick McGunigal, Humble Ship's Fitter, Saves Balloon Pilot From Drowning

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The first medal of honor "for extraordinary bravery" to be awarded to an American fighting man during the war has been given to Patrick McGunigal, of Youngstown, Ohio, the Navy Department announced today. McGunigal is a ship's fitter aboard a United States cruiser in the war zone. His heroism in rescuing the pilot of a naval kite balloon from drowning brings him an honor medal and a gift of \$100 from the Navy Department.

The captive balloon of the cruiser was 400 feet in the air, its observer searching for submarines, when it was struck by a squall. The balloon dropped 200 feet. The spare cable was hauled in on the ship, but the basket was whipped and twisted and the pilot was so entangled in the ropes that there was no possibility of his releasing himself. The balloon was hauled to the ship's side, but the basket trailed in the water, submerging the pilot. McGunigal, who has been fourteen years in the naval service, went over the ship's side and jumped to the ropes. He cleared the tangle and fastened a bowline around the pilot, who was then hauled on deck.
