ONE hundred and fifty women from all over the United States, including representatives from points as far west as California, were present at the initial meeting of the committee in New York, at which Dr. John R. Mott, chairman of the National War Work Council, was an honored guest. An air of deepest seriousness pervaded the meeting, as the purposes of the committee and the need of woman's help in association work were discussed. Doctor Mott formally welcomed the new committee and the help that the women of the nation can give the Y. M. C. A., and, through it, the men at the front. Mrs. James urged the women in attendance, and the thousands more they represent all over the country, to make the great effort of their lives to be of help in this time of need.

THE auction bridge party which is being given this afternoon at the Manheim Cricket Club for the benefit of the French Wounded Fund has turned out to be quite a large affair. Nearly all of Germantown is interested in the work which this organization has been doing since it was started two years ago. A large group of women meets every Tuesday morning for two hours in the ballroom of the Manheim Cricket Club to make surgical dressings and to roll bandages. Last year they sent 94,000 dressings to the field hospitals in France. In connection with this, Mrs. George Newhall collects knitted squares and sews them together to make blankets for the Belgian and French babies. They work entirely independently of any other warrelief organizations and are really doing a remarkable amount of work.

About 140 tables of bridge were sold for this afternoon and samples of the work which they have been doing were displayed in booths. Tea and sandwiches were served during the afternoon and streamers. there were several cake and candy tables. In order that everything might be "according to Hoover" the sandwiches were made of graham bread, and those who made candy have to deny themselves the luxury of sugar on their cereals until their extravagance is canceled.
