CARTER AND SITLEY HAVE BEST SCORING RECORDS IN THE TWO SCHOOLBOY FOOTBALL LEAGUES

Northeast and Penn Charter Lead in Offensive Records—West Philadelphia High Possesses a Strong Defense

NICK CARTER, of Northeast High, with 35 points and Captain Sitley, of Penn Charter, with 33 points, lead the interscholastic and Interacademic Football Leagues, respectively, in individual scoring. The advantage of the two leaders, however, is such that it is possible for Captain Kick Kinsman, of Northeast, and Friedman, of West Philadelphia, to beat out Carter and Brown, of Penn Charter, to finish in front of his teammate for individual high scoring honors. One more game will be played by the ten schools in the two circuits.

In the interscholastic league, Captain Dick Kinsman, of Northeast, has made the greatest number of touchdowns, having five to his credit. Captain Sitley leads the other circuit with the same number as Kinsman. Carter, with eight, shows the way in goals from touchdowns. This is due to the fact that the Northeast halfback has had more opportunities to add this extra point than his rivals. In the private school organization Brown and Johnny Earp are deadlocked with four goals from touchdowns.

Strange as it may be, only one goal from the field has been made in both leagues. This was kicked two weeks ago by Nick Carter against West Philadelphia High. Last year six goals from the field were registered in local scholastic ranks. Carter would have several more opportunities to his credit, but the inability of the Northeast line to hold account for the many failures.

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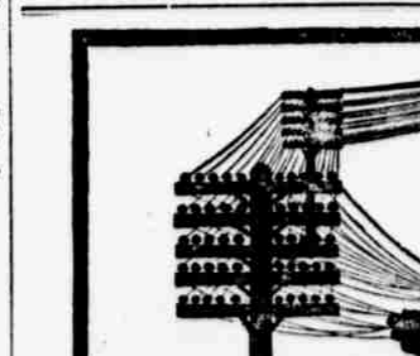
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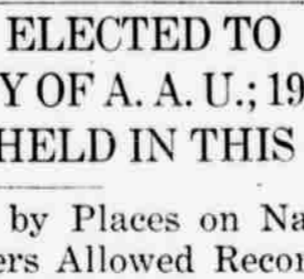


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
