



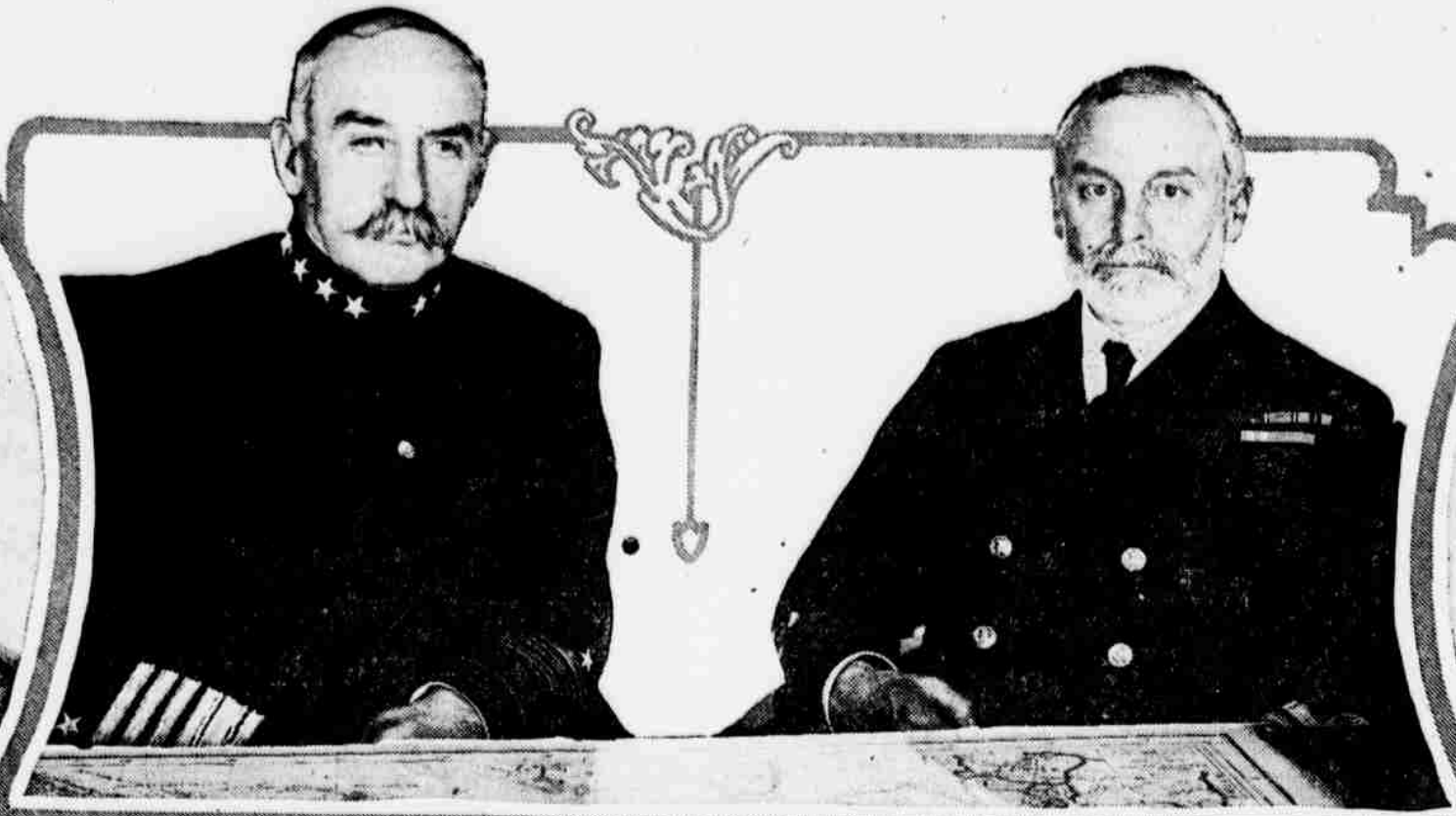

Brigadier General Frederick V. Abbot has given up river and harbor work in New York to assist Major General Black in supplying General Pershing with technical recruits.



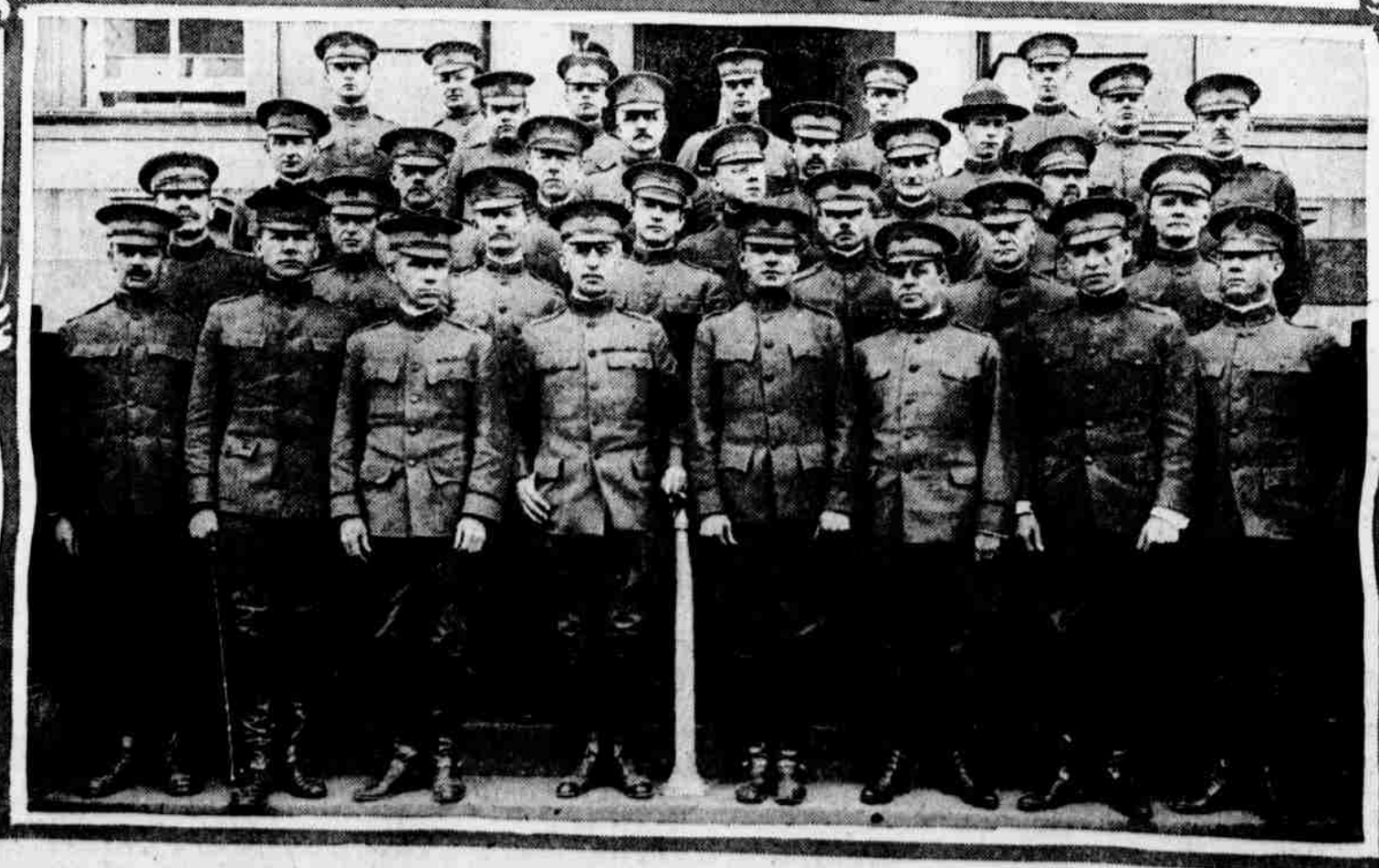
**"PHOLDS THE NAME OF EVANS"**
