FINANCIAL PROBLEMS CONFRONT UNITED STATES IN COMING YEAR

Maturing of \$2,000,000,000 Railroad, Municipal, Industrial and Public Utility Notes a Subject of Serious Consideration

THE financing of the nearly \$2,000,000,000 railroad, municipal, industrial and public utility notes and bonds which will mature in 1918 is still a subject of perious comment among financiers, especially with the principals of the houses which have been responsible for the floating of many large issues which will mature early next year.

It is said the matter has been prominently brought to the attention of the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve Board, in view of the possibility that all available investment funds will be required by the Government in the prosecution of the war.

It is estimated that the new financing, outside Government requirements, will

call next year for about as follows: Railroads, \$1,000,000,000; municipals, \$400,000,000; industrials, \$200,000,000; public

utilities, \$200,000,000, and miscellaneous, \$150,000,000. It is admitted that the problem of the railroads is the most vital and the most serious. Something heroic must be done in their case, for no half measures will meet the situation, but what form the remedy shall take is the puzzling question, With railroad securities at the lowest ebb ever reached in many instances, to pay off or refund at least \$1,000,000,000 seems impossible. There can be no relief through new stock issues; any assistance that might come through a 15 per cent rate

As regards a majority of the public utilities, it is generally conceded there will be little difficulty in securing extensions for a year, or even two years, if necessary. Some of the short-term maturities of certain public utilities may have to be reissued at a higher interest rate.

It was recently believed by some financiers that the immediate needs of some of the larger industries could be relieved sufficiently through rediscounting by the Federal Reserve banks, but recent developments in the case of a large corporation have not favored that plan, although a great deal is likely to be accomplished in a legitimate manner for some industrials along these lines.

As to municipals, perhaps the figures quoted-\$400,000,000-is over the mark for the coming year, as the spirit of economy has properly taken hold of many municipalities, and many projected improvements will in all probability be held over for the present. Besides no form of security could so successfully compete with Government issues as tax-free municipals, and few municipalities would care to be placed in the seemingly unpatriotic position of entering into open competition with the Government for finances under present conditions. It is more likely that municipalities all over the country will confine their 1918 issues rigidly to absolute

Big Shipbuilding Project for Mobile, Ala.

Considerable attention has been given recently to developments in shipbuilding and industrial plants in the South, particularly in Mobile Bay. The Tennessee Coal and Iron Company, a subsidiary of the United States Steel Corporation, has purchased a large tract at Mobile and has started building an immense shipbuilding plant, with villages to house the workers. It plans to spend more than \$11,000,000. There will be ten ways for shipbuilding in connection with this one plant.

Besides the operations of the United States Steel Corporation, more than a dozen ways have been constructed by other companies and keels for ships have already been laid. The city of Mobile has issued \$600,000 in bonds for a municipal terminal and docks.

It is said the tract acquired by the United States Steel Corporation at Mobile covers 12,000 acres, which is more than the present area of Mobile itself.

Railroad facilities at Mobile, it is reported, are largely responsible for the purchase by the Steel Corporation, as the distance from the big Birmingham plant of the company is barely 150 miles. Congress has approved a thirty-foot channel in Mobile River, where there is now one of twenty-seven feet, and this improvement will accommodate the launching of the largest vegsels.

Lansdowne's Peace Proposals Cause Little Interest Here The peace announcement of Lord Lansdowne had very little if any effect on

the security market yesterday. One banker in the central part of the city said that as Lord Lansdowne belonged to the old school of diplomacy and was politically opposed to Lloyd George anything he said would naturally be colored by his lifelong prejudices. "Besides," he remarked, "I think, personally, he is trying to camouflage the Germans."

Regulation for Collection of War-Stamp Taxes

Beginning this morning the war-stamp taxes become effective on all sales and transfers on stock exchanges. Tentative regulations are being prepared by the Internal Revenue Commissioner at Washington. In the meantime every broker, exchange, clearing house and person engaged in stock transactions is required to register with the internal revenue collector of the district today, when the provision becomes effective. Each then must keep strict account of the amount and nature of all dealings and report to the collector on the fifteenth of each month. Stamps may be bought only from the collector on formal requisition, and by comparison of the monthly reports with stamp purchases it will be possible for tax officials to ascertain whether any evasion of the tax is attempted. If the collector has such a suspicion, he is authorized to conduct an examination of the books showing stock or produce transactions.

Britain Considering "Premium Bond" Issue

of premium bonds. Premium bonds are well known on the continent of Europe,

but such a step will be quite an innovation for staid, dignified English bankers, In France, especially, the premium bond is very popular on account of the element of chance or lottery which enters. The plan is briefly that a certain bonus is attached to bonds of certain numbers, or rather that all the numbers of the bonds sold of a given issue are placed in a lottery, and certain bonuses are attached to the numbers drawn in pre-arranged intervals, say the tenth, or twentyfirst or fiftieth number drawn is entitled to a given bonus.

The last big exposition held in Paris in 1900 was financed in this way by the ssue of bonds of twenty francs each. To each bond was attached twenty coupons, which were merely tickets of admission to the exposition and could be used by any one. Each bond carried a number and a certain number of bonuses or cash prizes were offered to the winning numbers, which were publicly drawn before the close of the exposition.

The proposed British premium bonds, however, would carry regular interest coupons, would be paid in full at maturity and would have the premium bonus feature added as an inducement. It is a question if such a plan would succeed in the United States, but the gambling instinct is not dead here, whatever may be thought of the morality of the proposition.

Railroad Agreement Not "Pooling," Harrison Says

That any system of "pooling" is being adopted in the operation of railroads was emphatically denied by Fairfax Harrison, chairman of the Railroads' War Board in Washington. In explanation of the matter Mr. Harrison says; The Interstate Commerce act forbids the pooling of freight traffic or earnings

by competing railways. The plan which we have adopted does not involve or contemplate the pooling of either traffic or earnings. We have merely arranged for the use of physical facilities in common at places and to the extent necessary to enlarge sufficiently the capacity of the eastern railroads. If the word "pool" is applicable, what'we have partially pooled are the physical facilities.

The condition we are dealing with is analogous to that brought about at times by accidents, or by floods, such as that at Dayton, O., a few years ago. The flood at Dayton made it impossible for certain railways to handle all the traffic which normally came to them. Therefore, they diverted large amounts of traffic to railways which were still open. Similarly, at the present time, certain railway lines have become so congested that they cannot handle all of the business which is coming to them, and we are adopting measures to bring about greater utilization of other railway lines to relieve the situation.

SILVER TO BE DISCUSSED

Objections' to Proposed Price Bring Conference in Washington
