WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN FOR CAMDEN HOSPITAL

West Jersey Homeopathic Needs \$100,000 to Prepare for War Work

The campaign to raise \$100,000 in ten days for the West Jersey Homeopathic Hospital, Mount Ephraim and Atlantic avenues, Camden, so that it can liquidate its present indebtedness and add a new department for war emergency work, will be formally opened tonight at a dinner at the Y. M. C. A., 256 Federal street.

Governor Walter R. Edge will be the principal speaker at the dinner, in which about 300 workers will participate. The needs of the hospital will be outlined by Charles A. Reynolds, president of the institution and chairman of the executive committee, and C. M. Smith, director of the campaign, will outline the methods.

When the Surgeon General's department school for emergency accommodations the West Jersey offered forty beds. To meet the requirements of the war department, however, it will be necessary to add another department to the institution and build in addition to the nurses' home. At the present time twelve of the nurses are compelled to sleep in the hospital proper because of inadequate housing facilities. Actual work of the collection of funds will begin tomorrow. The first rally will be held at the Y. M. C. A. building at noon Friday. Twenty-five teams will engage in the work, nine of which are composed of women.

NOBLEVILLE, Va., Dec. 5.—Lieutenant Commander Richard B. Williams committed suicide in a hotel here after being relieved from duty for treatment of his eyes. The body was found yesterday when the family instituted a search. Commander Williams, relatives said, feared the loss of his sight. He was appointed a naval surgeon from Virginia in 1900. His home was in Norfolk. He was forty-two years old.
