# GOSSIP OF THE STREET

## RUMOR ON R. R. DICTATORSHIP CAUSES SHARP SLUMP IN STOCKS

#### Mention of McAdoo or Lane for Post Brings Suggestion of Government Control in Near Future—Gossip of the Street

THE report that either Secretary McAdoo or Secretary Lane would probably be selected by President Wilson to be Dictator of Railroads was said to be the cause of a big slump in leading railroad stocks before the close of the market yesterday.

That the appointment of any one as dictator spelled Government control of the railroads was the opinion generally held by financiers, but of the two men mentioned the majority were in favor of Secretary Lane. Up to the time this report was circulated many were puzzled as to the attitude of the railroads' representatives as gathered from the statements attributed to them in the morning papers, and some were at a loss to know what the railroads really wanted. It was freely remarked that there was no definite agreement among them as to what would be considered the best solution of their present problems. The recommendations presented by the Interstate Commerce Commission in its report to Congress last week seemed to be turned down, and with this action was coupled a demand for the original proposition, namely, an increase of rates. It is only a short time since the public was asked to believe that the 15 per cent rate increase would not meet the extra demands made on the railroads by employes for present and prospective increases in wages, even if it were granted, and that some other plan had to be found to pay dividends and replace equipment. It was notorious that new financing, with railroad securities at the prices they are bringing, was out of the question, even If the matter of competition with the Government's financing did not prove a barrier. Now the public is told by the spokesman of the roads that they don't want \$1,000,000,000 from the Government or from any one for new equipment and extensions, and they say that if they had the \$1,000,-600,000 they could not purchase the equipment, as it is not to be had.

Now it would seem that the President has taken hold of the situation, and that with the necessity for financial aid by the Government there seemed no other choice but Government control. This does not mean Government ownership, as many at first conclude. In this particular instance it would simply mean that the roads will continue under their Present management, with the Government furnishing the sinews of war in the form of financial assistance.

One broker remarked that there seemed to be a relationship between the changed tone of the representatives of the roads and the suggestions made by the life insurance presidents in convention in New York last week. He called attention to the first suggestion of the four which they sent to the Government on the subject and which made an increase in rates a condition precedent to any other plan. Of course, this meant that if the Government through the Interstate Commerce Commission did not agree to raise the freight rates, no other suggestion could be considered. Many persons were loud in their approval of the action of the commission in not deciding in favor of higher rates, as they had been led to believe that with every increase in rates there had been an increase in wages for operatives, and they were wondering where the endless chain would end.

Not many brokers expressed an opinion as to the probable effect Government control may have on railroad securities in the future, and those who did said a great deal depended on who would be appointed railroad

#### After-War Business and Social Conditions

General conditions after the war were being discussed yesterday, when a banker raised the question of after-war social conditions, but at the same time acknowledged he had never given the subject much, if any, thought, and for his part he believed that social conditions would be about the same after the war as before. Another said that after all the whole financial and commercial fabric of any nation hung on the social fabric, and the fact that Great Britain already has begun to set her social house in order in anticipation of radical changes after the war should be a lesson to the

"No one," he said, "in Great Britain fails today to recognize that the nation cannot begin again after the war where it left off on that day when war was declared with Germany. All classes, for the 'class' line is more strongly drawn in England than here, have fought side by side; together they will return to civil life, and their influence on those who have remained behind in civil life will have a broadening effect. .

"Committees," he said, "are in existence in Great Britain now studying this important subject, and the problem will be to strike an even balance between the relative future positions of brawn and brain, to locate their proper spheres without permitting a too great preponderance of either

#### Cassatt Favors Thrift Stamps as Christmas Gifts

Robert K. Cassatt, director for national war savings for Eastern Pennsylvania, said yesterday that he is getting along in good shape with his organization, which he is endeavoring to complete as early as possible. He suggested that employers of labor who in past years have been

in the habit of presenting their employes with cash for Christmas presents should give them war-savings stamps this year, and in this way accomplish what they have done in past years, but in addition will have helped se Government. At the same time they will encourage habits of thrift. He expects great returns from this suggestion, which will be made through all his agents. He also says that arrangements have been made to exchange the war-savings certificates for Liberty Bonds drawing a higher rate of interest, should there be another Liberty Loan authorized.

The disappointments of printers in furnishing him with the necessary literature, Mr. Cassatt says, are his greatest trouble at present, but he hopes to overcome it in a few days.

#### Russian and Other War Developments

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With the news from Russia of the breaking up of the empire into some eleven or twelve small republics, there is a possibility of that country, after a few more revolutions, settling down and eventually becoming the United States of Russia.

There is no doubt, according to some bankers, that the unsettled conditions in Russia are having an influence on the market in general. This influence changed somewhat for the better when it was announced that Japan had landed troops at Vladivostok and that General Kaledines, the Hetman of the Don Cossacks, with General Korniloff, had started a counter-revolution against the Bolsheviki. Coupled with the news of the entry and possession of Jerusalem by the British, the effect on the market was moral and psychological, and prevented any serious falling off in the list outside the railroads, which were affected by the news of the appointment of a railroad dictator.

#### American Tobacco Company's Request Causes Surprise

The announcement that the American Tobacco Company had requested authorization from its stockholders for permission to convert \$50,000,000 common stock into B shares without voting power, and which caused such a violent break in tobacco shares on the market, was the subject of considerable discussion on the Street yesterday.

Curiosity as to the reasons why some large concerns are putting nonvoting shares on the market recently was freely expressed, and while some said it was to prevent control of the concerns passing into other hands, this was not generally accepted as the real reason, more especially in the case of the Tobacco shares.

#### American Water Works and Electric Earnings Grow

The earnings of the three months ended September 39, 1917, of the American Waterworks and Electric Company show an increase of \$23,558. The increase of net income for the same period is \$26,782.

This is remarkable in view of the universal increase in cost of operation of virtually every public utility in the country.

#### Miami Conservancy Bonds in Big Demand

It was reported yesterday morning that 75 per cent of the \$10,000,000 54 per cent bonds on the Miami Conservancy District, Ohio, which were first offered on Monday last by a syndicate made up of the National City company, the Guaranty Trust Company and the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, all of New York, were sold before 10 o'clock yesterday.

It is evident from this that the demand for municipal tax-free bonds is still very strong.
