mas campaign, and all the members of the Red Cross who do active work are engaged in filling the house that night and in getting memberships from all directions. It does seem marvelous that there are still in these United States persons who have not yet joined the Red Cross; and yet there are, and so many that it is almost unbeliev able. I've been thinking it over and wondering why, and something I heard said opened an avenue of thought as to why was. This person was under the impression that to join the association meant you had to work for it, and as she is a very busy woman and quite unable to give any time to making surgical dressings and bandages and so forth, she thought she ought not to join. Fortunately, the person to whom she spoke knew all about it and set her straight, and the Red Cross had gained another member.

WONDER if we women think of what we may all be doing by next Christmas? You know it's a time when one must think about these things. I heard Captain Latham speak recently at one of the numerous meetings one is always going to these days. He was telling about the women of England. Well, of course, conditions here are not yet as they are in England; and in fact, as Captain Latham said, the United States would have had to ruise an army of 17,000,000 men before things here would be on the same plane as in England - and please God they won't have to-and then he told us about the women in his family.

He was so simple about it, taking it as a matter of course, and yet his heart must ache pretty hard when he thinks of them. For they were women who had never had to do any kind of difficult or hard work and who had never had to be on time for anything unless they specially wanted to be. Captain Latham said there were two men in his family, himself and his brother, and the brother is in the trenches now; and there are five women-his mother, who is a matron of a hospital; his, wife and his brother's wife, who hold positions in banks; his sister, who is in a munition factory, and his little sister of seventeen, who is driving a taxicab about London. And that is not all. His wife has a little baby of ten months, and she has to take care of it as well as attend to her work in the bank. There are no nurses to be had for love or money over there.

Think of it! And better still, think of the strong spirit back of those frail and delicate women; the spirit that makes them strong to bear and do in the place of the men who have had to go to the front. And let us prepare ourselves in spirit for what may come, that we, too, will show the same spirit of sacrifice for the love of God and country if we are called upon to do likewise. With the Russian truce and the freeing of hundreds of thousands of Teuton prisoners who will surely be brought in time to the western front it's not a very funny outlook, is it?

YOUNG Licutenant Robert Walter Starr, Jr., who is the son of Dr. and Mrs. R. Walter Starr, of this city, is "over there" working in one of the base hospitals. He writes that the work is simply wonderful, but eight hours a day do not seem adequate when there are so many to be attended to. And it's simply pathetic to see w grateful the men are for the profes sional attention given them.

Lieutenant Starr graduated from the De Lancey School in 1910 and from there went to the Medico-Chi College of Dental Surgery. After receiving his diploma he was Instructor there and at the Philadelphia Dental College. He received his commis sion in June.

Despite the cold and rainy weather and heavy fogs, Lieutenant Starr says in a letter to his parents, "our men are doing noble work and are eager for re-enforcements from home. Too much cannot be said of the wonderful work the Y. M. C. A. is doing for them." And later: "The food is good, chicken every third Sunday and the promise of turkey and trimmings for Thanksgiving and Christmas." So it goes, and the letter arrives here after the Thanksgiving which he is so pleasantly anticipating.

They say there is wonderful work being done by the dental surgeons over there, but I imagine there is less of it than the other surgical things; so that is probably why he speaks of eight hours, for most of the doctors have not mentioned any set time for work.

DID you know that the Bob Clays have a dear little daughter? She was born a week ago and will be named Mary Frothingham, after Elizabeth's mother.
