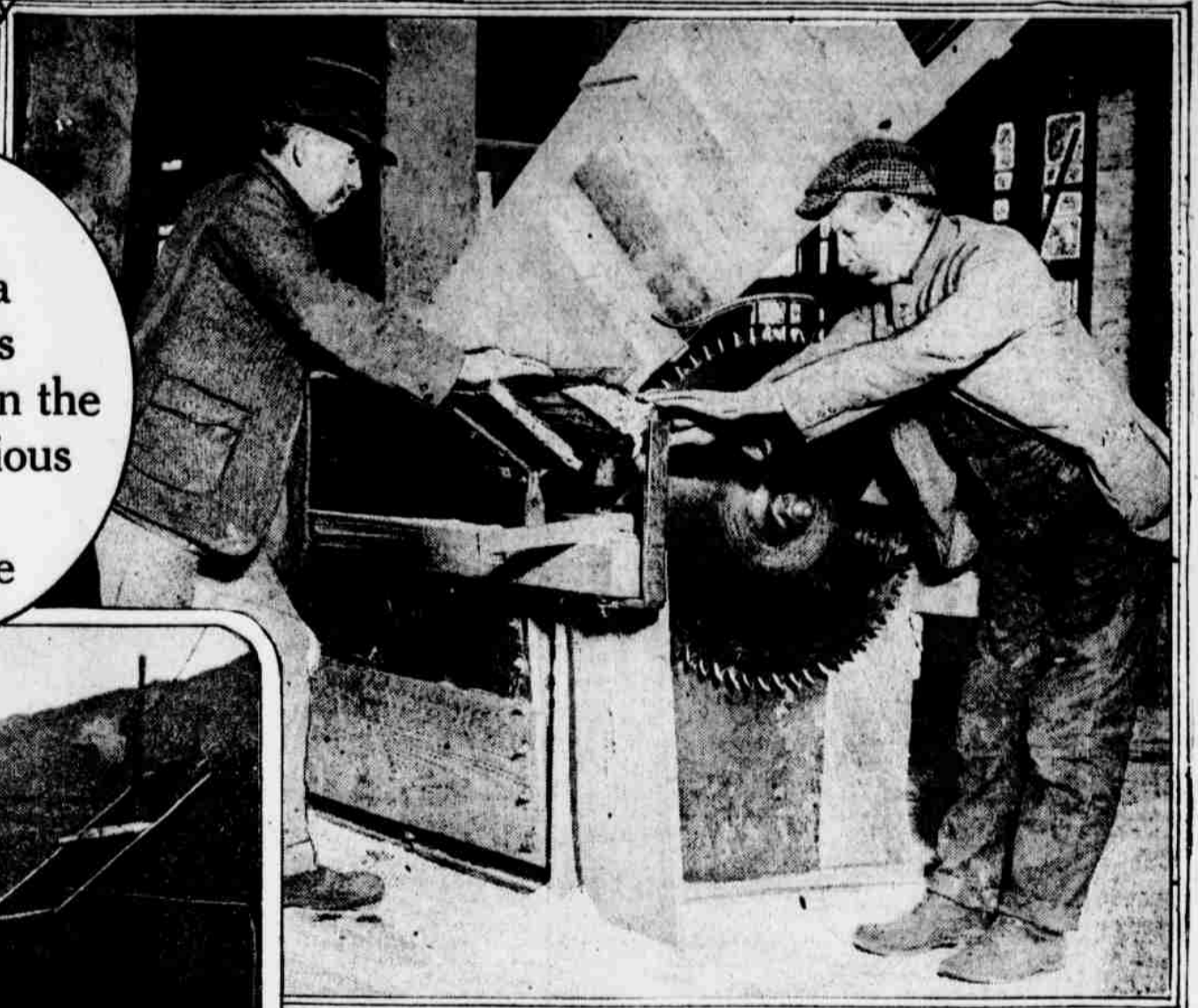


The Camera Pictures Incidents in the City's Serious Fuel Famine



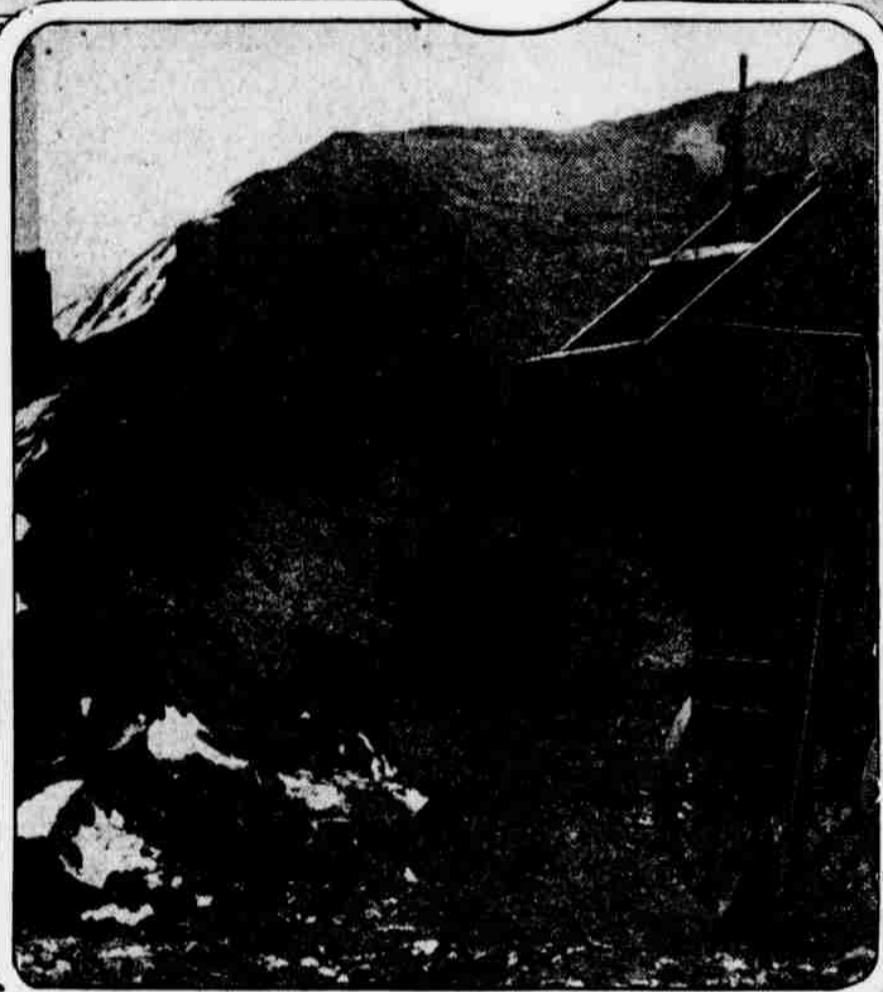

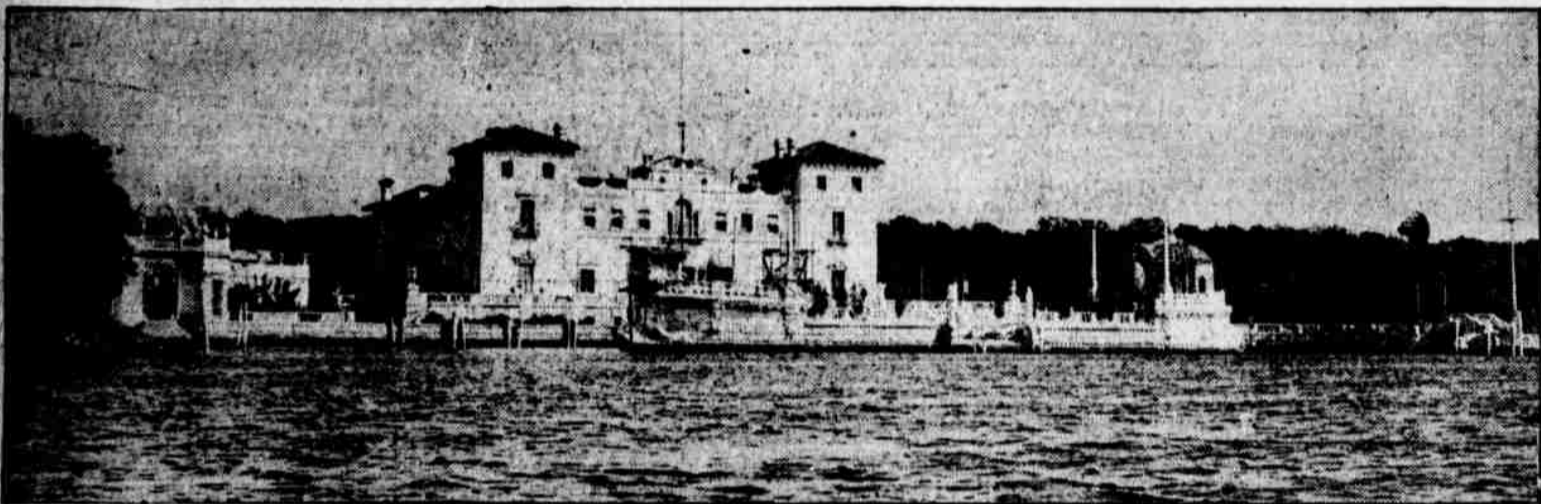

One of the Palatial Residences at Miami, Fla., Where Winter Visitors Find Relief From the Fuel Problems of the North.

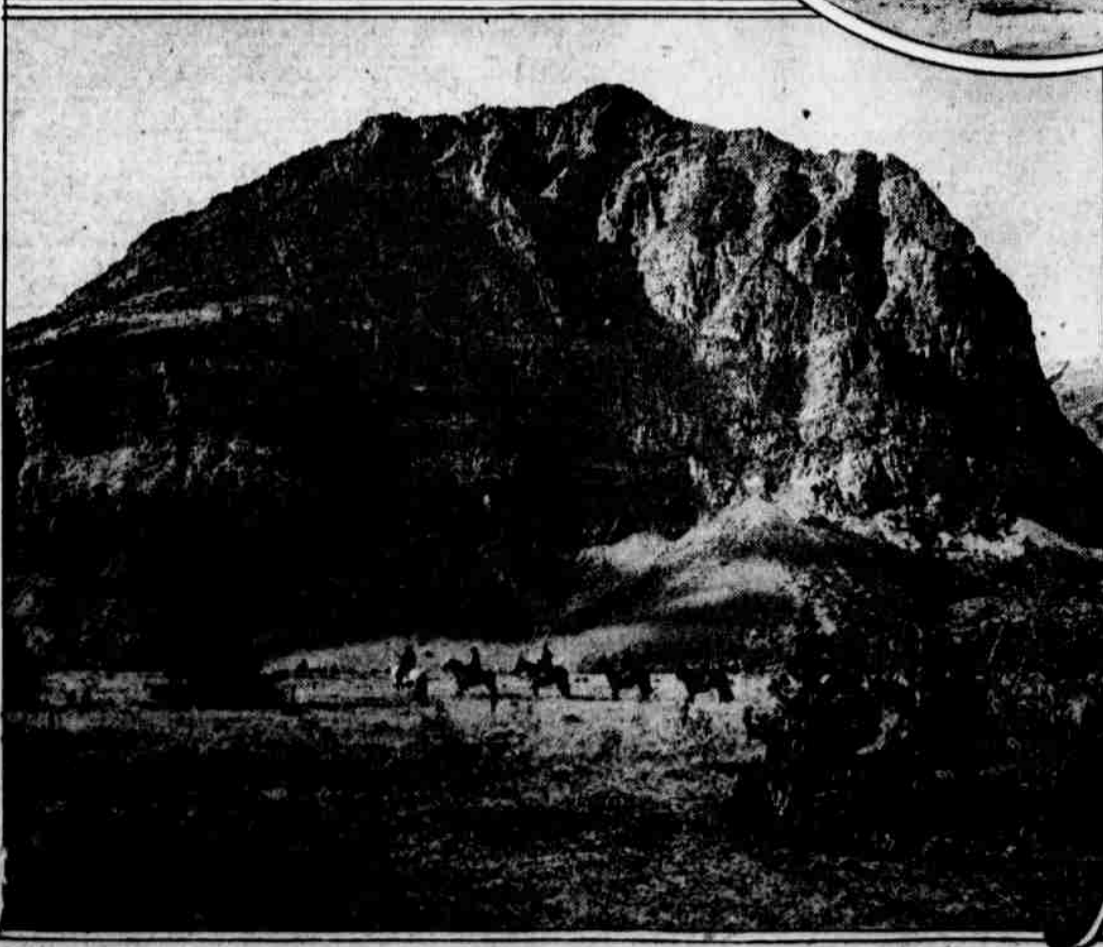
