Lansing Publishes Telegrams Showing Former German Minister's Connivance

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. Secretary Lansing has made public the complete record of Count Lux-burg, former German charge d'affaires to Argentina, in the German Govern-ment's South American intrigues. It is a long indictment of German diplo-macy, based on Luxburg's official diary of underhanded connivance against the Argenting and other countries in South America. merica.

Latin-American diplomatic quar-In Latin-American diplomatic quar-ters here it is regarded as certain that the disclosures will result quickly in an Argentine declaration of war against Germany. Congress and a majority of the people favored this step when the American Government made public the "spurios versenkt" (sink without a race) messages of Lasburg, and it is believed that the President's opposition now will be swept away, if it is not withdrawn. The correspondence deals largely with efforts made by the German min-ister to prevent any rupture of rela-tions with Argentina, and throughout the dispatches there was a warning to his Government to flatter the Ar-rentinians and to word the note in reply to the Argentine protest against the sinking of the steamship Toro in such way as not to offend them. Evidence of the apparent plability of the Argentine President and of the opposition of Minister of Foreign Af-fairs Puercydon is disclosed in many cause.

The disclosures complete the story of Luxburg's intrigues, which began when the State Department gave cut the famous "spurlos ver-senkt" messayes. They are of im-portance chiefty because of their bear-ing upon various hereforer unex-plained activities in South Amer-ica, and are particularly interesting at this time, when Luis Cabrera, envoy of President Carranza, of Mexico, is on his way to Argentina to attend a so-called neutrality conference.
