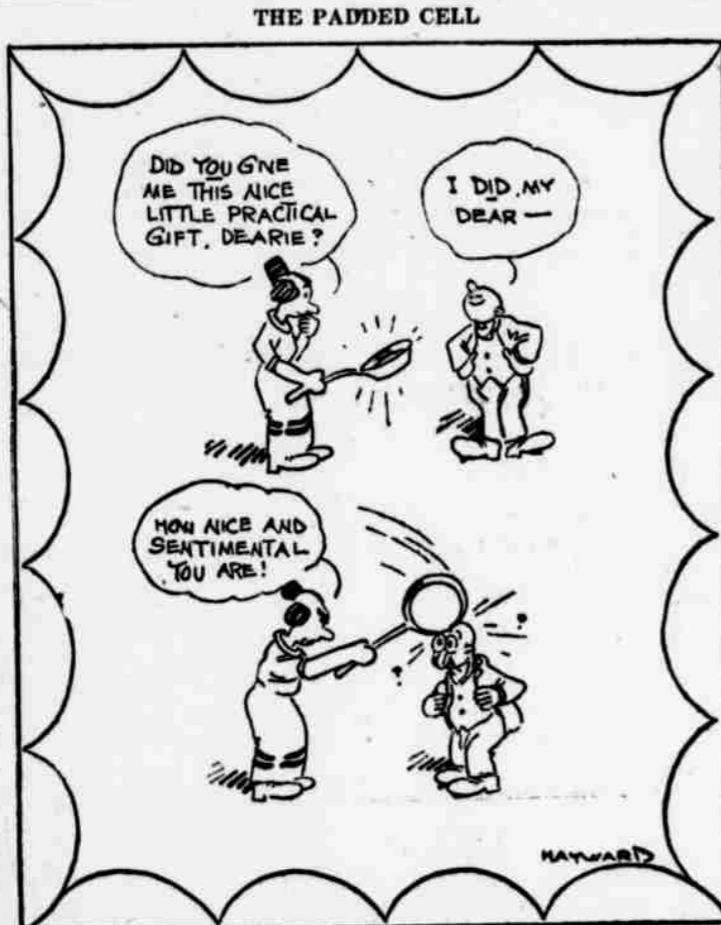

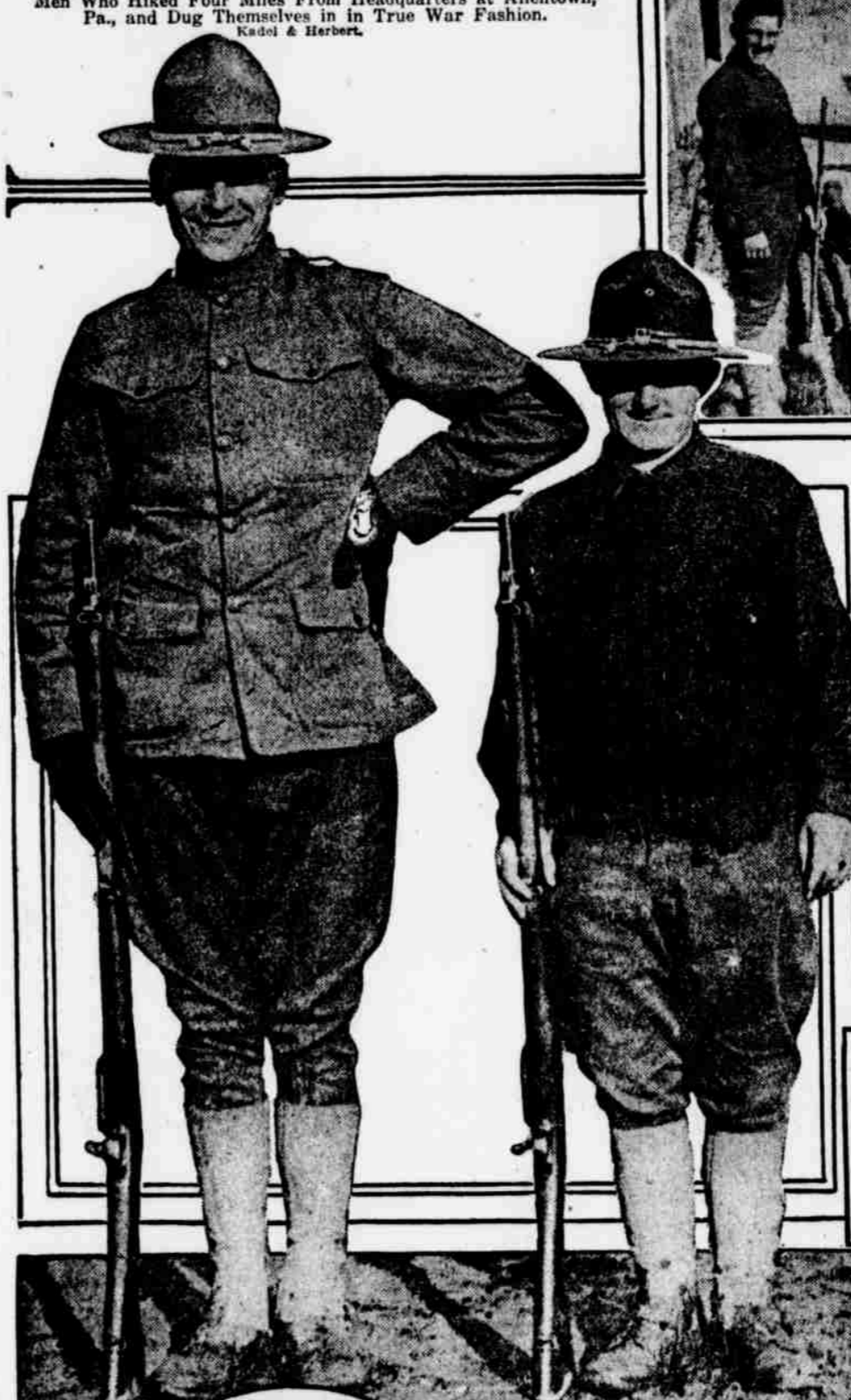
Mrs. Ruem—Your husband is still devoted as a lover. I don't see how you manage it.
