NOGALES, Aria, Jan. 5.

Seven persons are reported dead to-day and more than forty wounded by Yaqui Indians who attacked a Southern Pacific De Mexico train at Mapolia, twenty miles west of Guaymas.

The Indians, according to reports here, first fired a bridge and the train ran into the chasm, wrecking it and killing the engineer and conductor. The Yaquis then fired into the train, it is said, killing and wounding many.
