

GOSSIP OF THE STREET TRUST STOCKS RISE SWIFTLY ON POSTPONEMENT OF SUITS

Market Responds to Attorney General's Motion, Which Is Believed to Forecast a Cessation of Drastic Provisions—Gossip of the Street

The principal topic of conversation in financial circles in this city yesterday was the action of Attorney General Gregory in his motion asking the Supreme Court for postponement of consideration of the court at its present term of the seven anti-trust cases.

There is an impression prevailing that this motion will be renewed from time to time during the period of the war.

It was also stated on good authority that the administration has no present intention of taking any steps looking to the dissolution of so-called monopolies, at least for the period of the war.

While action along these lines had been anticipated for some time past, the news came with almost as much surprise as President Wilson's railroad proclamation.

Since the bill introduced in Congress at the request of the Administration legalizing the pooling of overseas agencies and trust plans in general, the present move has been anticipated, and many financiers are inclined to believe that we have heard the last of "trust-busting."

At the same time it is also believed that after the war, when the United States will push her commercial plans in foreign countries more vigorously than has been done in the past, there will be a modification of trust laws which will permit the widest latitude for consolidation for overseas trade purposes.

Something to be modeled after the European cartel system, but adapted to the business needs of this country, it is believed generally, will be adopted.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3. — Buying for English and domestic trade account was the feature of the trading in the cotton market and advances of 5 to 18 points were recorded.

There was a jump in the spot market, and room traders also supplied the list. Wall Street operated on both sides, selling the distant months and buying the near months.

After the call demand from commission houses was large and Liverpool continued to advance and, as a result, prices advanced still further.

Receipts at the ports for the day were estimated at 15,000 bales, against 14,574 bales last week and 20,956 bales last year.

Special expresses and luxuriantly equipped trains, such as the Congressional National Express, Twentieth Century Limited, Broadway Limited and Colonial Express, are to be discontinued in a short time, this official said.

Trains for commuters will not be distributed, and with few exceptions local trains will continue to run as heretofore.
