PICKETING CREDITED FOR SUFFRAGE STRIDE

Mrs. Lawrence Lewis Says Without It Success in New York Was Impossible

Mrs. Lawrence Lewis, who has for menths been working with the National Woman's party at the Washington headquarters and making only occasional visits to her home in this city, spent Tuesday in Philadelphia interviewing some of the Pennsylvania Congressmen and having conferences with leaders of the Woman's party. At the headquarters of the Pennsylvania branch of the party Mrs. Lewis said:

"Picketing has accomplished the seemingly impossible. It has not only kept suffrage alive, but has made it an acute issue from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Canada to Mexico.

"Even before our country went to war it had become almost impossible to gain the attention either of the President or of Congressmen on questions relating to woman suffrage. They were taken up with war business. Picketing was begun to remind the President and Congressmen that women were still waiting for action and that in a war for democracy abroad it was an act of the highest patriotism to see that democracy was established at home. Without picketing, New York's victory would not have been possible.

Jones, which proves any stories of the poor equipment of the boys in France to be the work of the German propagandists. The young man who man propagandists. The young man who will be twenty-one years old on February 6, is at the headquarters of the Detachment Field Artillery, figst division, A. E. P., France, wrote the letter on November 29, 1-17. He wrote: "We had a good dinner for Thanks-giving; turkey, goose, cranberries, pie, cake, figs, candy, apples, bread, butter and coffee, it sure was fine. We have plenty to eat. The weather is awful, always raining,' I have only seen the sun shine once. I have been transferred to the main headquarters, where all the generals are. We have not where all the generals are. We have not much to do and that makes it lonesome. But they say we will get our horses in a week and we can get out to drill. We are like foreigners in the United States. We cannot tell what the French are saying, but it is great to hear them. It certainly was a sight the way we were received by the French peo-ple. You could hear them a mile away running down the street to meet us, and they sure did greet us. They even spread flowers when we were: inrching and when the French band played the "Star Spangled Banner" each one of us was given a flower. The weather is cold, but we have good clothes and plenty of gloves.
