#### VARE PUSHES BILL FOR NEW NAVY YARD GATE


Would Provide \$150,000 for Entrance and Accompanying Buildings at League Island

Appropriation for the erection of a gate at the entrance to the Philadelphia Navy Yard and accompanying buildings is provided in a bill introduced at Washington today by Congressman William S. Vare in the House.

The gate is needed at this time to take care of the ever increasing business at the syard, as well as to relieve the quarters of the Board of Labor Employment. The accompanying buildings will take care of the yard band, the mayrine guard and the offices of the Labor Board. The total cost is set at \$150,000.

Congressman Vare has taken the matter up with Secretary of the Navy Danleis and will endeavor to have the department approve the appropriation before the Naval Affairs Committee.
