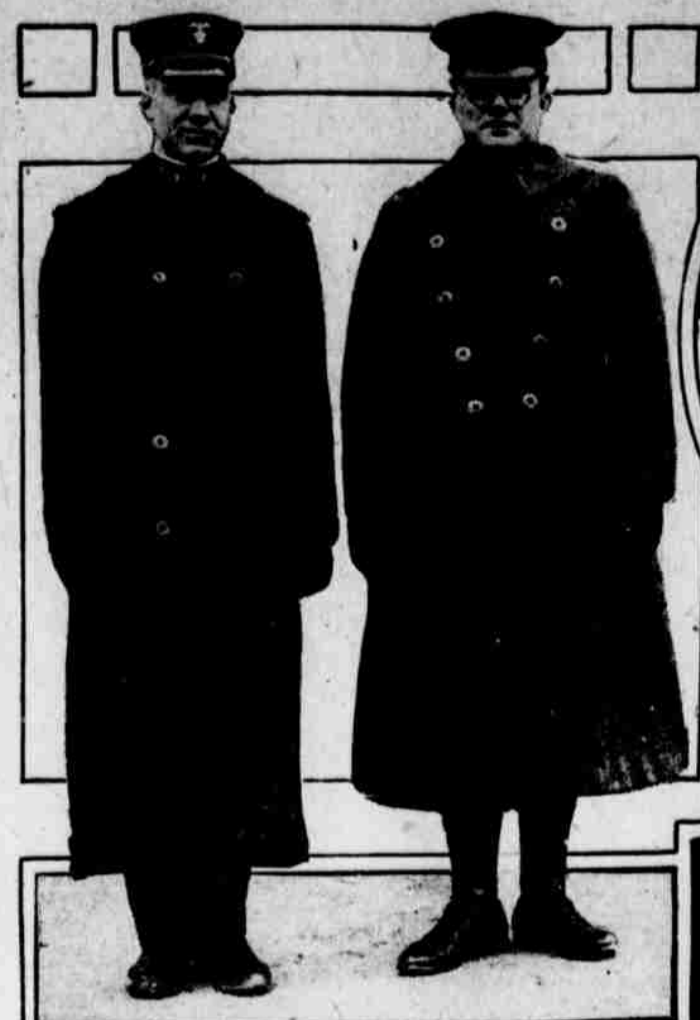
The Young Lady Across the Way

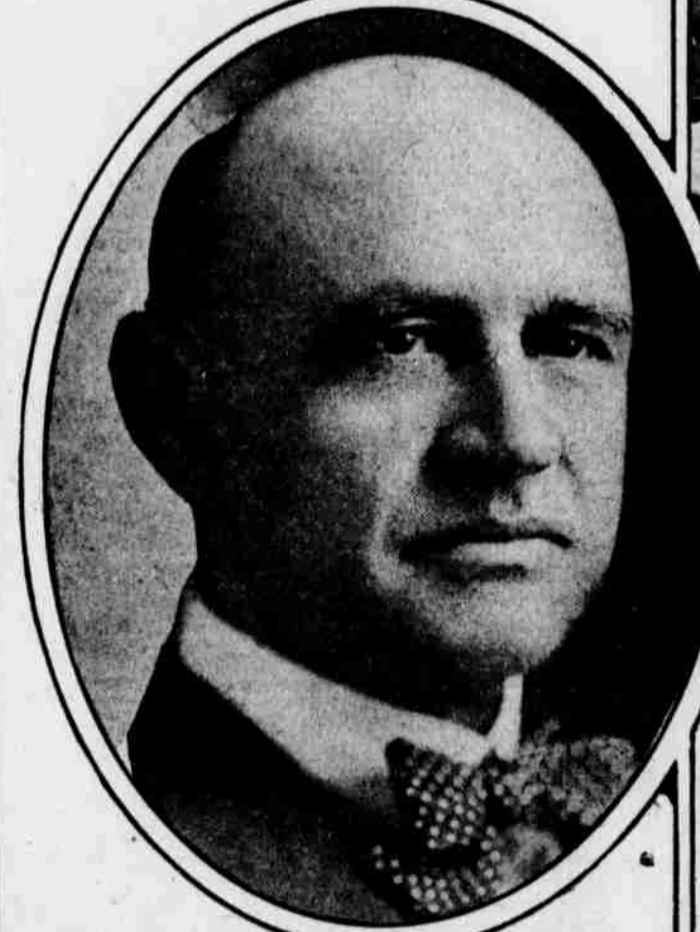
