Soldiers to Profit by Novel Machine Invented by Doctor Reilly

TESTED AT HOG ISLAND

Mechanical Washerwoman Cleans Anything From Overcoats to Scarfs

Probable reduction of the laundry cost per man per month in the United States army from \$4 to sixteen cents is one of the results of the visit yesterday of the director general of sanitation of the United States Shipping Board-Major Philip Schuyler Doane-to the shipyards at Hog Island.

The reduction will be brought about by the use of the new washing machine installed there by Surgeon Reilly, of the yard's sanitary department. An exhibition of the cleansing powers of the mechanical washerwenian was made for the benefit of Major Doane. Dr. Thomas Dat'ington, of New York, and other medical and army men.
