PHILOMUSIAN CLUB'S APPRECIATIVE GUESTS

These parties are given to the enlisted men of both army and navy every week, and each week shows their increase in popularity. There is such a "homey" atmosphere about the clubhouse these days that one sailor said he used up eight pages trying to tell his mother just how fine it is!

About twenty women act as hostesses each week, sitting down at a table with eight boys as their guests. To increase the touch of home each table is decorated with candles, a chafing dish and a percolator, and there are always plenty of fried oysters, potato salad and home-made cake with all the "fixings" for every one.

"If you boys only knew," said one of the women, "how we worry as to whether you prefer cold ham or roast beef, and whether pie or cake would be more enjoyable, you would realize how much we think of all of you and how we appreciate all that you are doing for us!"

The fact that the boys feel at home here, whether they come from California, Maine, Texas or Missouri, shows that the club is indeed filling a wonderful place in their lives. After the introduction by Mrs. Walter Hancock there was community singing in which every man was invited to join "providing he kept within one mile of the tune!" then Doctor Adams, of the Chestnut Street Baptist Church, addressed the men.

After Doctor Adams' stirring address Mr. Frank Tomlinson, of the University of Pennsylvania Base Hospital Unit, No. 26, entertained with songs, accompanying himself on the piano. He was applauded until several encores had been given, and then Mrs. Hancock told the audience that the remainder of the program was also very good, and she felt that every one would like to hear it.

After more community singing the entertainment ended and each man left resolved to come back next week if he had not yet started on his way "over there."

DINGY OIL PAINTINGS PROVED VALUABLE

One Picture of Saint Lost, Other Found in Attic of Devon Inn

When the Rev. John Bengtson, a Baptist clergyman and a chaplain in the United States navy, was sailing to the principal ports of the world he was commissioned by Mr. James S. Swartz, then a resident of Queen Lane, to procure for him any pieces of art work that in his judgment had special merit, the chaplain being a widely known art critic and having written descriptions of various works of art for several periodicals. In 1876 he sent to Mr. Swartz two dingy, faded oil paintings which he thought of value. These hung in the reception room of Mr. Swartz's home in Queen Lane until 1887, when they were sent to the home of his cousin, Miss Mary Simmons, in this city, and later were taken by her to Devon Inn, where they hung on the wall on each side of the door leading to her private parlor. They remained there after Miss Simmons' death.

One of the pictures is a portrait of St. James the Less, who, according to tradition, was killed with a club, and if the print were not so indistinct the club could be seen. It is by this insignia that the picture is designated. This picture was recently found stored in the attic of Devon Inn. The comparison print is missing. It represented St. Simon. He holds a saw because it was the instrument by which he is said to have been put to death.

The portrait of St. James the Less, 27 by 21 inches, was found by Mr. J. Clifton Buck while making a tour of investigation of the inn with a number of friends at the time of the reopening of the place as a school. Mr. Buck took the print to Mr. Benedict A. Omsis, an artist of this city. The picture has evidently been cut from a large canvas. It now adorns the office of Mr. Francis E. Lovell, president of Devon Manor, to whom Artist Omsis said: "The painting was partly ruined when it was cut from the large canvas. There are marks which indicate that attempts were made to restore it. This does not, however, hide the great work, which is without doubt the work of a great master in the early part of the eighteenth century. Such a painting is a rare find. It is intensely religious in its shades. Not only is it exquisitely painted, but the rich colors and splendid background mark it as the work of one of the world's greatest masters. The Titan influence is marked and even the texture of the canvas shows the age and quality of the painting. I believe this is the best piece of art ever discovered in Philadelphia."
