Times, published by the Seventeenth United States Engineers, "Somewhere," has just made its appearance.

The paper is full of interesting matter in men's camp anecdotes and story. The editorial section is represented by eight members of the Engineer Corps, together with regularly assigned reporters in each company, much as the plan of news gathering sources are carried out by modern newspapers the world over.

It is devoted largely to news of personal interest, including news of the noted Seventeenth, designated to the rigid test of the censor, so as to reach home folks as a medium of communication.

Considerable space is devoted to athletics, now flourishing in the American army camps "over there." The paper also has a department for announcements of religious services, and rhyme also appears, reflecting the romantic stress of service. The paper is really a breath from the hilarious and the solemn, the sunshine and the shadow of the American camps in the great theatre of conflict. It is issued weekly, and while no advertising appears in its columns, the publishers are confident of a circulation broad enough to support it, and make a permanent nucleus of interest "over there" as American troops remain in "Somewhere."

**WHY THE SAM BROWN  
BELT WAS BARRED**

The reasons assigned by the War Department for refusing to approve the use of the Sam Brown belt by officers in the American army are: First, that it is not part of the regulation uniform, and never has been, and second, that the belt has been used, and is employed to better advantage in other directions.

While there is no doubt that the heavy leather belt held in place by the smaller strap over the shoulder, adds snap and dash to an officer's appearance, it was never worn in the American army until after the war, and was not offered to the United States on war materials, and its use after that smacks too much of snap to suit the War Department.

The ruling of the department placing the Sam Brown belt under the ban proved equally a great disappointment to us, as it was worn in the corps of engineers. This "harm" and purchased it at a store which meant no "no" to the dealers.—New Orleans Times-Picayune.

# NEWS OF THE FINANCIAL WORLD—NEW YORK AND PHILADELPHIA STOCK PRICES

## STOCKS ADVANCE IN NEW YORK WITH TRADING BECOMING BRISK

Demand Increases After Quiet Opening—Steel Common and Bethlehem "B" Score Gains Soon After Start

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The first few minutes the stock market showed an absence of vigor, although the majority of issues traded in were fractionally higher, but before the end of the first fifteen minutes the demand increased and trading became more brisk, with many of the leading stocks making rapid upturns.

United States Steel, which closed yesterday at \$1.15, advanced to \$1.20, and Bethlehem Steel "B" and other steel industrials made fractionals.

Numerous specialties then became prominent in the trading, National Enameling being one of the chief features, advancing from 42½ to 43½. Tobacco Products advanced 1½ to 55¾, and Mexican Petroleum moved up from 92½ to 93¾.

There was .01 inch of precipitation at Mobile, and .02 at Birmingham, and .03 at New Orleans.

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
