THAT sure does seem like five weekdays of real work done by members of Mrs. Crawford's committee, doesn't it? I asked how this was managed and Mrs. Crawford told me that when a crop was ready she was notified and immediately communicated with the one in charge of the pickers for the day, and when nocessary, orders were given for the truck to be at the scene of operation with barrels and ladders and other things needful.

THE truck was loaned to the committee by William McIntyre, of Ardmore, and was always ready for service whenever called upon, which you will agree was decidedly "of" service as well as for it. A good bit of work was done by the volunteer workers themselves, too, in the way of transportation, those who were able to take baskets with them in their motor, having done so.

One Tin Lizzie was known to carry ten baskets of tomatoes, five boys (not that by that I would insinuate that boys are sometimes "young tomats") and the driver for three miles one day.

I must be of an inquisitive frame of mind, for I asked for the report of the thirty-three kinds of produce that had passed through the hands of the committee, because, you see, I found myself getting interested and I judged if I am interested in this thing perhaps there are others who might also like to hear about the work, so here goes the news as to what they picked: 154 bushels of apples, 80 baskets of tomatoes, 79 bushels of rhubarb, 264 bunches of beets, 390 quarts cherries, 275 heads lettuce, 10 bushels spinach, 2 bushels of onions, 27 quarts of strawberries, 1050 ears of corn, 1 basket horseradish, 12 bushels crahappies, 12 bushel seckel pears, 27 bushels of swiss chard, 22 bushels of string beans, 12 quarts gooseberries, 7 bushels grapes, 6 bushels of plums, 11/2 bushels peppers, 2 bushels of okra, 3 heads of cauliflower, 31% quarts of blackberries, % bushel of eggplants, 3 bushels carrots, 7 bushels of squash, 66 cucumbers, 51, bushels of lina beans, 6 bushels peas, 126 heads of cabbage, 15 bushel of kohlrabl, 315 bushels of peaches and 187 quarts of currants.

MRS. CRAWFORD says that the com-mittee cannot help feeling that outside of saving the produce which usually goes to waste along the Main Line they themselves derived real benefit from the education and pleasure which they were able to give the forty-one small boys working with them. Not only did they enter into it with the spirit of doing a real piece of war work, but it is felt they have almost "learned a trade" and received more than they realize from sixteen weeks spent working in the open and an unconscious education from the trips to the places they Visited. 
