Rush to Uncle Sam's Colors Has Removed Many Diamond Notables From the Present Scene of Action-Season of Uncertainties

THE wild call of spring is about to send the athletes hying southward And the hying this year is going to be considerably more afflicted with onesomenoes than at any other time within the memory of major leaguers and other spangled favoritos of the populace.

The faces present, as a matter of fact, will look like a new layout for many of the upper baseball class. A glance into the army and navy would locate many of the players who last year were among those present.

The pennant hunt in the 1918 season appears from a long distance glance to be just as much of a guess as it was a year ago. Transfers that have been made during the winter, while benefiting some clube and faying injury on others, nevertheless leave a balance in both big leagues that should make the dash from barrier to the finish a hot one.

In the minds of most fans, of course, there will be a spark of favoritism for the White Sox in the American League and for the Glants in the Navional League. Just as in pugilism, baseball is prone to string along with the old champion until the sawdust has been kicked out of its doll.

But-there isn't a thing certain in buseball. The late Harry Pulliam made famous the remark, "Take nothing for granted in buseball." There are clubs in either league which, if given the right mart, kept free of in juries and allowed to proceed at an even pace down the field, would be fully capable of getting under the wire first.

INJURIES to this or that club might intervene. Some star might crack and leave a void that could not be filled.

Top-Notch Club Must Be Smooth-Running Machine

THE top-notch baseball club, as a matter of course, must be a smoothly running machine. It must have no discension; its players must be friendly and willing to pull together at all times. If there is a baseball club not possessing these attributes, no matter how strong its potential ability may make it look, lay a few sheltels that it cannot finish alread. Mere gray matter, ability to knock basebails over fences and to field like demons, all are swept aside when the worry of arleved feellans errors into a base ball club,

Happily, dissension has been driven out of most clubs in the big leagues with greatest emphasis laid on the first division gauge. There was a time not so very long ago when things were not going overly nicely hmong clubs that had been ploked to win pennants, and for that reason they were laft in the rear.

It's called temperament in some compters, but the real definition for the trouble-maker on a baseball club is "no good."

Chicago is going to have something to say about both pennants. St Louis cannot be counted out of the National League first division and nmore can the Reds. The Dodgers and Braves have added strength. The Pirates, while stronger than a year ago, still look like a bad ball rlub. The Philles without Alexander, Killefor and Lixer have bright prospects and with the new talent the club should be in the running.

Boston has been strengthened some in the American League and the National League clubs look cheerler. The Yanha with a new manager, may start all over. While with the A's Eddle was Connie's best bet, and he kept up the good work with the St. Lovey Feds and later with the Browns. He quit in midseason iast year because of the forrid weather in the Mound City and also because of some rundus with Fielder Jones. Eddle and his manager are said to have been as friendly as a pair of mile-posts, but Fielder denies this. He atates that he and Plank are the best of friends and even exchange cards at Christmas. Ruth Only .300 Hitting Pitcher in Captivity

DITCHERS who can bit .300 are oft heralded in the feature stories and other branches of fiction, but the moundsman whose general average entities him to recognition in polite swatting society now exists only in one instance. According to the records this rare specimen of sport humanity is Rabe Ruth, the Red Sox heaver, who through the run of three years in a big league uniform is entitled to a place in the hitting hall of fame at a fraction above the minimum qualifying limit. His respective batting marks are .815, .272 and .326.

During his American League career the pounding harler has played in 166 games, has latted 261 times, scored 49 runs, made 109 hits and sacrificed 13 times. His big drive collection includes 23 doubles, 7 triples and 9 home runs. His four-bagger off Bill James on August 19 last is guaranteed to have been the genuine, bona fide and exclusive "longest hit of the season," The ball went into the center field bleachers at Boston.

The American League was crowded with pitchers who could hit last son. Among those who the records show didn't have to step aside as weaklings when a swat was demanded were the two Russells, of New York and Chicago; Mays, Cunningham, E. Myers, Caldwell, Ehmke and Bagby, Of these, Caldwell and Bagby are good pinch men and hard hitters, nithough their averages are not as high as some others. Hussell, of the Yankees, hit .313, standing next to Ruth, while his namesake of the White Sox barely missed .200, being only one point under that figure. Only four twirlers in the National showed any ability with the willow, according to the figures. These were Mitchell, Hendrix, Cadore and Barnes. 
