

BRITISH FOOD RATIONS CUT

Two Meatless Days a Week Ordered by Rhondda

MUST BRING OWN SUGAR

Guests at Hotels Have to Supply Sweetening - Menu Limited by Ounces

LONDON, Jan. 22. Draconic measures have been taken by Lord Rhondda to deal with the meat shortage. An official order was issued applying to all hotels, restaurants, boarding houses and public places, to begin forthwith. It specifies two meatless days weekly, Tuesdays and Fridays in the London district and Wednesdays and Fridays in other parts of the kingdom. Between 7 and 10:30 o'clock, in the morning no meat, poultry or game may be consumed on any day, and no milk may be consumed as a beverage except by children under ten years of age. A guest must provide his own sugar for sweetening beverages except that residents of hotels, clubs and boarding houses may be supplied with not exceeding six ounces of sugar weekly for this purpose, if they do not possess ordinary sugar tins.

The order gives the table, indicating minutely, even to fractions, the exact amount of meat, sugar, bread, flour, butter or other fats allowed each guest for each meal for the guidance of hotel and restaurant proprietors in their weekly dietary. Of fats only one and one-quarter ounces may be allowed each guest daily, of which not exceeding one-half may consist of butter and margarine.

The weekly allowance for each guest is: Meat, 30 ounces; bread, 4 pounds; flour, 14 ounces; sugar, for cooking, 2 ounces; butter or fat, 8 1/2 ounces. In weighing, two and one-half ounces of poultry or game are reckoned the same as one ounce of meat; four ounces of bread are reckoned as three ounces of flour.

Public eating places which do not serve meals exceeding fourteen pence (twenty-eight cents) in price, exclusive of beverages, are exempted from observing meatless days.

NORTHCLIFFE SPURNS CARSON CABINET JOB

Attack on General Staff Vigorously Criticized in London Press

LONDON, Jan. 23. There is not a word of truth in the report that he is to succeed Sir Edward Carson in the war cabinet, Lord Northcliffe asserts.

The Star, which printed Lieutenant Colonel Repington's interview, asks whether it was proposed seriously that Lord Northcliffe should take Sir Edward Carson's place in the cabinet. It added: "Was Lord Northcliffe made chairman of the American mission to give him entrance into the war cabinet by the back door?"

Some of the newspapers comment indignantly on the article in Lord Northcliffe's Daily Mail attacking the General Staff and on the resignation of Lieutenant Colonel Repington as military correspondent of the Times. The Daily News asks how long the country and Parliament are going to tolerate "this kind of public assassination," and insinuates that Viscount Northcliffe is the tool of a prominent politician.

The Daily Chronicle calls upon the Government to show courage and to prevent the press from indulging in such attacks, which are entirely beneficial to the enemy. The Daily Mail did not refer to the topic and the Times does not mention it.

The House of Lords, by 122 to 43 votes, inserted an amendment in the representation of the people bill establishing the principle of proportional representation in parliamentary elections.

The House of Commons has three rejected the principle of proportional representation, and it is expected that when the bill returns to the Commons the amendment will be rejected, especially as an attempt to include the principle in the present bill would tend to delay or possibly kill the measure.

BOROEVIC TO LEAD AUSTRIANS IN ITALY

Naming New Commander Indicates Continued Defensive Strategy

ROME, Jan. 22. The Austrian Archduke Eugene has been succeeded by General Boroevic as commander of the entire enemy front against Italy and it is believed that the change may have a considerable effect on the campaign.

The two conspicuous enemy lieutenants on this front have been Lt. Marshal Conrad von Hotzendorf, commanding the mountain front, and General Boroevic, commanding along the Piave.

General Boroevic is the junior of the field marshal, and his passing over him is in the nature of a disgrace, probably growing out of the operations on this front. Field Marshal Conrad von Hotzendorf retains the command on the mountain front. He has represented the extreme element opposed to Italy.

General Boroevic's tactics on the Italian front have been uniformly defensive; rarely offensive. For two years on the Piave he maintained a defensive and took the offensive only when German reinforcements compelled an advance.

Since the formation of the new Piave line his policy has been chiefly defensive. The appointment of General Boroevic, therefore, is construed as confirming reports that the enemy proposes to maintain a defensive attitude on the Italian front for the present. It is also regarded as a concession to the Slav element of Austria, as Boroevic is of Slav-Croatian origin. General Boroevic stands out prominently in the military career; like Conrad von Hotzendorf, who up to this time has directed the Austrian military policy against Italy.

ASK BRITISH ORATORS TO TOUR U. S. CITIES

Peace Bodies Have Plan to Merge After War Aims of Allies

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. Promotion of unity between America and her European allies during the war and preservation of public opinion for a league of nations after the war is the purpose of invitations extended through Ambassador Page to eminent British statesmen and clergymen to come to the United States for speaking tours of its principal cities, the national committee of the churches and the moral aims of the war announced.

Herbert Asquith, formerly Prime Minister; H. H. Asquith, Viscount Bryce, Viscount Grey, Arthur Henderson, the Labor party leader, and George Adam Smith are among those whose services the committee will endeavor to secure.

The cablegram to Ambassador Page was signed by former President Taft and Alton B. Parker, representing the League to Enforce Peace; the Rev. Frederick Lyon, of the Church Peace Union, and the Rev. Charles S. MacFarland, of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. These organizations will have the co-operation of the committee on public information in arranging for the tour of the speakers, it was said.

Man Found Frozen to Ice

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 22. Edward Lewis, thirty-four years old, of 228 S. W. Madison street, was found frozen to the ice in Midway creek at Fourth street bridge last night by John Entwistle of this city. VIOLENTI AZIONI SUL FRONTE DEL TRENTO

Gli Italiani Respingono gli Attacchi della Fanteria Austro-Tedesca

DUELLI DI ARTIGLIERIA

Le Condizioni nell'Impero Austro-Ungarico Sarebbero Realmente Molto Critiche

ROMA, 22 gennaio. Fra le notizie giunte ieri dalle linee di battaglia, e da quanto è stato ufficialmente comunicato, si apprende che una considerevole attività di parte delle artiglierie si è verificata sulla fronte del Trentino.

I duelli di artiglieria furono più violenti nella Valle Lagarina, ove truppe tedesche tentarono di attaccare le posizioni occupate dagli Italiani, ma furono respinti prontamente non senza aver subito considerevoli perdite.

I duelli di fanteria austro-tedesca tentarono un'azione contro i lavori di fortificazione sulle posizioni italiane di Monte Pasubio, ma anche qui il tentativo fallì completamente poiché gli Italiani, a momento opportuno, fecero esplodere due mine che disperse e decimarono il nemico.

Alcune sulla sponda sinistra del fiume Adige, sempre sulla fronte del Trentino, tentativi di attacco da parte di contingenti nemici furono respinti brillantemente dalle truppe italiane.

L'artiglieria fu, pure, molto attiva sulle linee tra il fiume Brenta e Monte Grappa e lungo il medio corso del Piave.

Esso il testo del comunicato ufficiale, pubblicato ieri dal Ministero della Guerra in Roma:

KIN OF ROBERT E. LEE DIES IN U. S. SERVICE

Major W. Fitzhugh Lee Succumbs While in France

NEW LONDON, Jan. 22.—News has been received here of the death in France of Major William Fitzhugh Lee Simpson, brother of Mrs. F. Valentine Campbell, of Huntington street. Major Simpson was a graduate of West Point, was grandson of Robert E. Lee and a grandson of William Fitzhugh Lee.

Major Simpson was a son of Colonel William A. Simpson, adjutant general at Governors Island, and brother of Lieutenant Commander George W. Simpson, in command of the United States destroyer starbuck, which picked up Lieutenant Commander Byler, of the destroyer Jacob Jones, when that vessel was torpedoed by a German submarine recently.

Mrs. Campbell, of this city, and Sir Harold Naylor, of Washington, are sisters of Major Simpson. Major Simpson's home was in San Francisco when the war broke out he went to El Paso, Tex., to study machine gunnery. He was placed in charge of the American School of Machine Gunners in France.

He married Miss Florence Allen, a daughter of a prominent family in San Francisco, in 1914. She survives him as do two children. No particulars of Major Simpson's death are known except in a cablegram from General Pershing stating that death occurred January 17, due to appendicitis.

In questi ultimi giorni, però, i rapporti giunti da tutte le parti insistono col rappresentare la situazione in Austria realmente grave e che la politica austriaca in parecchie città è stata incapace di poter sedare i tumulti e che i ribelli hanno saccheggiato gli edifici, hanno dato fuoco a fabbricati ed hanno costruito barriere lungo le vie sulle quali hanno innalzato la bandiera rivoluzionaria rossa.

Dispués da Londra dicono che le notizie che giungono in quella città, circa la crisi in Austria, sono in aperta contraddizione tra loro. Infatti mentre si assicura che oltre un milione di uomini sono in scolorita e domandano pane e lavoro, d'altra parte si giungono telegrammi con i quali si assicura che gli scioperi sono virtualmente alla fine e che lunedì gli scioperanti torneranno al lavoro.

Un ultimo telegramma da Londra, giunto stamane, assicura che i torbidi in Austria sono giunti a tale convinzione di stata espressa da alte autorità in quel stesso telegramma. Il prezzo scende che le notizie fossero state veramente fatte circolare dal governo austriaco, si è dissipato rapidamente. Sembra accertato che il movimento in Austria è dovuto al fatto che il popolo è stanco della guerra ed alla smentita sarsana del viveri.
