THE annual show for the St. Francis House for Convalescents will take place tomorrow night in the Bellevue-Stratford ballroom. And, believe me, it's going to be quite some show. The Rev. Francis X. Wastl, who is a chaplain at the Almshouse, is chaplain at St. Francis' House also, and is heart and soul interested in the work, for he is able to send his poor people from blockley out to take up the work of their daily routine. Think of that!

BOARD of women headed by Miss Florence Sibley, who is president this year, has the care of the house in charge, and this board is supplemented by the Junior Aid. The managers hold a fair or market day every October on the grounds of the house, and the juniors give a play every winter for the support of the good work.

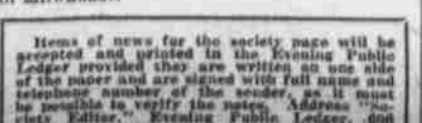
