During the last week they have been having a drive, in which they tried to exceed all the previous work they have done, and from the report it seems as if they must have succeeded pretty well, for they have turned out 300 214 by 214 wipes (have you ever done them, oh, gent'e reader, I ask you; have you?); 300 4 by 4 wipes, 300 4 by 8 compresses, 200 8 by 12 cotton pads, 200 12 by 24 cotton pads, 60 16 by 24 paperback pads and numerous other dressings. In making all these, more than 100 pounds of gauze and 100 pounds of absorbent cotton have been used.

SPEAKING of the Red Cross work, have you seen the beautiful work the stocking machines do? They make up almost a whole stocking in about fifteen minutes. and then you catch up the stitches on four steel needles and finish the toes and heels by hand. It saves immeasurable time, and is tust as well done as when all is by hand; in fact, those I have seen show no mark where the handwork is taken up after the machine has finished its part. It is certainly worth while having one. The Women Writers' Auxiliary, which has rooms in the Record Building, you know, has gotten one, and it's awfully interesting.

To GO back to the Daughters of the American Revolution; they have planned to take one week in every month for a drive and intend to work steadily on every day in that week. Mrs. Samuel Kerr is chairman of the auxillary and Miss Dobbins is treasurer.

A member of the chapter, who did not wish her name divulged, donated an ambulance and kitchen trailer to the American Ambulance abroad. You know, the trallers are attached to the ambulances and can be used at any time to provide the ounded men with hot food. The authorities have allowed the donation to be placed in the division of the American Ambulance n which young Ogden Nevin, son of the chapter's regent, is serving.
