everything will be conducted on "strictly business" principles. That .is-with one big exception-for there will be no "overhead" expenses of any kind in connection with the Service Shop, and all profits will go to the Overseas Committee for tobacco, chocolate and the many little comforts which help to make the life of a soldier or sailor more endurable.

The Ritz-Carlton has donated the use of the shop, and all service is volunteer, as each of the aides takes turns serving there several times a week.

Besides this, many of the attractive knitting bags have been donated by various members of the committee, and also a large number of finished articles which are for sale, including helmets, wristlets, scarfs and sweaters.

THE MOST important feature of the shop, of course, is the wonderful assortment of wool which they have for every conceivable kind of "war work." There is white yarn for the new socks, gray for the sailor boy and olive drab or khaki for the marines and soldiers. These include both heavy and light weight wools, but each one is of the very best quality and moderately priced.

In addition to these articles, everything which could be connected with knnttng will be on sale there, such as yarn winders and holders, knitting needles and little cases for them, knitting bracelets andquite important, though not exactly connected with knitting-are the wonderful service flags, whose sale will show the patriotism of the purchaser in more ways than one.

Many customers have already been attracted to the little shop by its quickly earned reputation of selling the best goods at the most moderate prices.

She says that, in the first place, everything is so expensive that only the rich people can afford to buy what would one time have been considered common necessities. These things have since become luxuries. For instance, one cake of swap is forty-nine cents. Therefore, it is utterly impossible for the poor people, espe-cially those in the invaded towns, to wash their clothes, and many of the children are given baths at the expense of the Govern-ment. For this reason the different war re-hefs are using gray material instead of ment. For this reason the different war re-liefs are using gray malerial instead of white to make clothing for both the women and children. Madame Giroud inspected one of the beautiful little layettes which had been com-pleted by the Women's Army and Navy Relief and, while she agreed that the cor lief and, while she agreed that the contents were perfect in every detail, she suggested— and the idea was adopted—that the next ones be made of darkgray outing flannel. This seemed a shame, so far as beauty was concerned, for the little pink-knitted cans, with pink ribbons, white socks, etc., looked so sweet and dainty, and gray seems such a somber shade for a little baby's outfit; but, of course, they will be much more specified. somber shade for a little baby's outift; but, of course, they will be much more service-able and practical under the circumstances. A layette comprises nineten articles, and they are needed more now than ever before, as there are thousands and thousands of little orphaned babies to be cared for. The school children all wear black aprons made of satine, usually, because they write in ink entirely in France-having no pencils as we do in America. Both the women and children prefer dark clothing on account of children prefer dark clothing on account of the dearth and expense of soap and lack of washing facilities. A sewing bag, with soap, comb, hairpins, black and white cot-ton, darning cotton, needles, thimbles, scis-sors, etc., is to be added to the list of ar-ticles comprising a layette, as the women have absolutely no materials with which to mend their clothing. Besides this the Army and Navy Relief is going to make outfits for children between the ages of fourteen and sixteen, who suffer a great deal from cold and lack of proper clothing, as most of the garments are made for women or very small children and bables.
