ARROUSE POTTER'S IRE

Notifies U. S. Marshal to Prepare for Arrest of Refractory Dealers

LAST WARNING GIVEN

Those Who Disregard Priority Orders Face Imprisonment and Fine

William Potter, Federal fuel administrator for Pennsylvania, today called on United States Marshal Noonan to prepare for the arrest of coal dealers violating the priority orders for coal.

No more warnings will be given, Mr. Potter announced. Hereafter, he said, arrest and imprisonment would follow in every case where the priority arrangement is disregarded.

Extra vigilance against theaters and homes or industries favored in the priority order was taken by the fuel administrator. Mr. Potter emphasized a sharp lookout for coal deliveries in their neighborhoods and asked that the public be requested to report violations promptly.

This latest order was issued by Francis A. Lewis, chairman of the Philadelphia coal committee. The order has been notified to coal sellers in the theaters until the full requirements of all householders are filled.

To show that he means business, and is determined that the needs of the small consumer are to be met, Mr. Lewis said that it has become necessary to eliminate all places which are not used for sleeping purposes.

The mild weather has not resulted in increased shipments to Philadelphia. In the last twenty-four hours, only 6400 tons of domestic coal reached the city.

Shipment of inferior coal from the mines has been ordered discontinued by Fuel Administrator Gaudin, that every car available might be used for the shipment of coal with full fuel value.

Mr. Huffington complained that while he was unable to obtain coal for the supply of his own concern from his own bank, he was being used to haul coal banks from the anthracite regions into Philadelphia and other manufacturing centers.

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Chief Hicks says it would not be fair owing to bad weather. Notwithstanding the long neglect of street cleaning contractors and their failure to remove ashes, Chief Hicks, of the Street Cleaning Bureau, has declared that to fine contractors would not be fair because of weather conditions.

Senator Vane, who holds street cleaning contracts, when asked about the failure to live up to specifications, said that ashes are now being collected and that he expects to be fined when ashes are not taken up.

PLAN FOR PROPOSED STEEL SUSPENSION BRIDGE TO SPAN THE DELAWARE



Engineers acting for the Pennsylvania and New Jersey bridge commissions have drawn up plans for the world's longest suspension span to connect Philadelphia and Camden. PLANS FOR HUGE DELAWARE RIVER BRIDGE NOW COMPLETE

Continued from Page One. The spiral approach on this side would empty into an already completed section of Delaware avenue. In order to offset this difficulty it is now proposed to build a bridge off the second dock of the spiral to Front street, thus diverting traffic to a large plaza at Delaware avenue and the river front.

Material and unit stresses have been calculated in minutest detail, while an assumed live load and an estimated dead load are divided the length and breadth of the structure. The roadway is 114 feet wide, with a central roadway forty feet wide for commercial and pleasure vehicles.

Two pedestrian ways are provided on each approach, leading to the promenades and to the recreation center. Without any crowding the bridges, pedestrian ways of 2000 sq. ft. each, and two electric cars in one hour.
