

RE TROOP SHIP LOSSES WILL FOLLOW

Eric Geddes Warns That Casualties Must Be Expected

LONDON, Feb. 8.—There will be more transport losses, America must keep a steady stream of men flowing across the Atlantic to the Allies' man-power, Sir Eric Geddes, First Lord of the Admiralty, said today.

MEMBER TUSCANIA TO BE BATTLE CRY

LONDON, Feb. 8.—Remember the "Tuscania" will be a battle cry to the colors and battle of victory for the Americans in the London newspapers declared today. An editorial comment sympathized with the Americans over the "Tuscania" dead and demanded that the Americans should increase shipbuilding with the aid of the Allies that the submarine problem be conquered as quickly as possible.

10TH ENGINEERS, NOT 10TH ON THE TUSCANIA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The War Department erred in an earlier announcement that detachments of the Tenth Engineers were on the "Tuscania." It is composed of the one referred to in the report, however, is not the Tenth Engineers, but the First Wisconsin Battalion signal corps and men of the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Wisconsin Infantry.

NAVY DEPARTMENT'S REPORT INCOMPLETE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The report of the "Tuscania" to the Navy Department announced today. This information, men, crew and passengers, is incomplete. The Navy Department today received a telegram announcing seventy-six officers and 1,274 enlisted men of the army were landed at Buncrana, Ireland; and sixteen officers and seamen of the army were landed at Larne, and that approximately 570 officers and enlisted men of the army have been landed at Lisay, Ireland.

In addition approximately ninety officers and members of the crew were reported to be in hospitals. Six members of the crew and seventy-two soldiers are in the military hospital at Londonderry; ten soldiers are in Loughlinny Hospital at Londonderry and nine soldiers and two of the crew are in the military hospital at Londonderry.

TUSCANIA SURVIVORS TO TRAIN IN BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The highest possible praise for the British destroyer convoy was accorded in official circles today. The "Tuscania" it now is admitted, was only one of a very large fleet of transports, most of them loaded with supplies. The convoy had taken a position close in shore, so that the convoyed fleet would be between it and the rapidly fading light.
