HOFMANN IN GREAT MOOD

Brilliant Polish Pianist Electrifies Auditors at Philadelphia Orchestra's Matinee Concert

Josef Hofmann, in his most masterful mood, onquered the emotions and thrilled the ensies of yesterday's large audience at the Philadelphia Orchestra's concert in the Academy. In the highly effective tempestusus concerto in D minor of his own preoptor, Rubinstein, the superb Polish pianist thundered through the storney parages of the last movement in an exhibition of sheer power, electrifying even those familiar with the artist in his most inspired norme

In striking contrast had been the delicate remanticism of the andante, impregnated with the stractors spirit of bric poetry and untouched by sentimentality, while a display of crystalline technique, forst en unployed, had characterized the copening.
