

UNITE LENT SERVICES TO HELP SAVE COAL

St. James's and Holy Trinity to Combine With St. Mark's on Weekdays

To assist the fuel administration in saving coal, no weekday Lenten services will be held in St. James's or Holy Trinity churches, it was announced today.

Instead of the usual noonday services during the Lenten season, the rectors of the three churches decided to hold joint services in St. Mark's Church, Locust street, between sixteenth and seventeenth streets, which will continue as heretofore, as no one church is large enough to accommodate the normal Sunday congregations.

FIRST WAR LENT

Lenten services are announced by the Rev. Louis C. Washburn, rector of Old Christ Church, on Second street above Market. This being America's first Lent during the war, said Doctor Washburn, carries with it a momentous message.

"If the Christian spirit and civilization are to survive and prevail," he said, "the Church must be made to meet our present needs with unswerving comprehension and power. The Christian who fails to appropriate and share its spiritual tonic is a slacker, withholding vital reinforcement at the most critical point. Even with our dearest at the front, we dare not be too busy to seek the aid of Him who alone can lead us to lasting peace. In speeding up the output of essentials for real victory we must not lose sight of the fact that we are again and again to keep first things first. Nothing less than a recurrent and enabling sense of values again must be our constant aim, lest we be misled and revert to degrading self-interest and selfishness in the service of our gallant men in the service. Our nation depends upon the Church to mobilize our religious resources."
