This disease frequently accompanies catarrh of the larynx. It is not infrequently that we have named catarrh of the darynx and bronchinal catarrh combined. A severe attack of this kind is frequently termed catarrhal lever.

When there is severe frontal headache, soreness of the limbs and pain in the joints, with tenderness, the patient is frequently said to have catarrhal rheamatic fever.

At the beginning of the disease the chest feels "stopped up" and there is severe coughing, but little expectoration, as the secretion is scante.

After a few hours or days the secre-

tion becomes much more abundant and

tion becomes much more abundant and is expectorated easily and the cough is said to be "locke."

Other symptoms are a severe shivering and chills, often alternating with a slight fever. The patient has a head-ache, feels disinclined to exert himself and has little appetite. The tongue is coated and humming or ratting sounds are frequently heard in the chest. In treating bronchitis, give frequent and continuous inhaling of warm vapor, Alex warm, moist compresses on the Also warm, moist compresses on the chest should be worn during the infer-vals of treatment.
