NEW YORK MARKET UNSETTLED AND PRICES GENERALLY LOWER

Movement of Steel Common Confusing, With Sales Large—Pool Manipulation Causes Some Big Advances

High Points in Today's Financial News
New York stock market was unsettled throughout the day, with many issues declining, while others advanced.

The stock market showed an unsettled, irregular tone all through the day, with many issues in supply at declines, while some in which there has been evidence of pool manipulation moved up to the highest prices reached in months.

The movement of United States Steel was confusing. War houses sold 35,000 shares of that stock, while the only large buying was by Moore & Schley, who took 5,000 shares.

Between 55 1/2 and 56 1/2 more than 50,000 shares were traded in during the afternoon without altering the market position of the stock.

Bethlehem Steel "B" was influenced by the Schwab statement on the year's prospects and declined 1/4 to 73 1/2, and Crucible Steel ranged from 65 1/2 to 67 1/2.

American Car and Foundry was one of the strongest features, moving up from 75 1/2 to 78.

Many of the railroad stocks were also in good demand, with St. Paul preferred, after selling at 65 1/2, advancing to 72 1/2.

Mexican Petroleum was traded in on a large scale all through the day, advancing 3/4 to 93 1/2, but lost most of this gain in the final trading.

Marine preferred was also strong for a time, advancing 1/2 to 100 1/2, with the reaction to 95 1/2. There was pronounced strength in Pittsburgh Coal all through the day, that stock advancing 2 points to 53 1/2.

The most important feature in the bond market was the heavy selling of Liberty second 4s, which ranged from 96 1/2 to 96 3/4. Some of the railroad bonds showed a firm tone. Foreign government issues were quiet.

CHEVROLET MOTOR AGAIN CLAIMS ATTENTION IN TRADING ON CURB

Stock Falls Below Price of General Motor—Exceptional Strength in Charcoal Iron—Mines Irregular—Oils Firm

There was an irregular tone again today on the Curb, with the movements in Chevrolet Motor again attracting attention, that stock ranging from 122 to 115 and selling below the price of General Motor.

According to the terms of exchange it has an advantage value of 1/4 more than General Motor. Aetna Explosives also developed weakness, ranging from 8 1/2 to 8 1/4, the accumulation of stock for reorganization purposes having apparently been completed.

Exceptional strength was shown in the Charcoal Iron issues, which were in demand from strong sources with accumulation apparently for immediate interest in progress in both the common and preferred stocks.

Motor shares were neglected, Curtiss showing a heavy tone and declining to 36 1/2.

Oil stocks were firm. Houston Oil advanced to 47, and there was a good demand for Northwest, which was traded in at 82 to 87 cents.

Mining stocks were irregular, with a good demand for Big Ledge based on reports of development work in the Henietta mine.

Yukon Gold was weak because of the expected dividend reduction, and sold down to 7 1/2.

FEBRUARY CLEARINGS DROP

UNITED GAS IMPROVEMENT EARNINGS CUT BY INCREASED COST OF MATERIAL

Statement for 1917 Shows Big Drop in Total and Net Profits—Local Stock Trading Dull. Cramp Off 3 Points

Increased cost of materials used in the manufacture of illuminating and fuel gas resulted in a large falling off in the earnings of the United Gas Improvement Company for the fiscal year 1917 as compared with those of 1916.

Total earnings from both sources were \$182,444 for the year ended December 31 last, a decrease of \$1,277,112 as compared with \$9,440,557 the previous year.

Regular dividends paid in 1917 totaled \$4,753,713 more last year than in 1916, with the result that the net profits were \$5,915,905, an amount of \$7,269,321 for the preceding twelve months, or a decrease of \$1,355,826.

Regular dividends paid in 1917 totaled \$4,753,713, an increase of \$1,277,112, and the amount transferred to undivided profit account was \$1,232,750, a decrease of \$1,498,345.

In the annual statement of earnings for the last two years, which was made public today, attention is called to the payment of an extra dividend of \$1,110,000 out of the sale of securities.

Trading in home shares was generally quiet in today's session of the Philadelphia Stock Exchange, with the majority of prices fractionally higher than business largely confined to odd lots.

The most active was Tonopah Belmont.
