CITY BOOSTS HOUSING PLAN FOR HOG ISLAND
 Mayor Signs Agreement Placing Materials at Government's Disposal
ORDINANCE IN EFFECT
 Sand and Gravel to Be Taken From Municipally Owned Property to Ship Plant

An agreement through which the city will render to the Government valuable aid in the development of the Hog Island shipbuilding plant was signed this morning by Mayor Smith and Director Batesman, representing the city, and officials of the American International Shipbuilding Corporation. The agreement placed at the disposal of the Government of the company certain materials which are essential to the construction work within the shipyard and which will hasten the completion of this work considerably.

The agreement is in accordance with the ordinance recently passed by council at the request of Mayor Smith and Director Batesman after they had conferred with officials of the company who pointed out to them that the city could be of great assistance to the Government if it were to lend its aid toward the acquisition of the material desired. The materials consist of sand and gravel which are to be taken from the city-owned property which is situated virtually at the very door of the shipbuilding plant.

It was the idea of the Government, acting through the company, to obtain the materials with as little delay as possible, so that the construction work, which has been planned at the shipbuilding plant, could be pushed to completion without any stoppage of any kind which was absolutely necessary. It is understood that the materials are to be used in the construction of railroad sidings, piers and the laying of foundations for buildings. Under the terms of the agreement, it is optional with the city whether it shall accept pay from the company for these materials or take in lieu of the pay materials which can be used for constructive purposes.

STOTESBURY APPEALS TO BANKS TO AID U. S.
 Urges All to Become Members of Federal Reserve and Help in Loan Campaign
 "Unless the people of the United States successfully support the next Liberty Loan, we, as a nation, are beaten."

This warning has been sounded by P. T. Stotesbury in an appeal for all Philadelphia banks and trust companies to become members of the Federal Reserve system. He has appealed to every banker and trust company head to line up their institutions in favor of the issue of certificates of indebtedness which the Government is about to make. These certificates are converted into bonds soon after the loan is floated.

In urging financial institutions to become a part of the Reserve system, Mr. Stotesbury pointed out that only six of the banks and trust companies in the city are members. "It is not fair for the large companies to carry the others," he said. "All should be liberal and come in. We have got to help the Government with our money or fall in our efforts to win democracy for the world. We must induce the people to buy the stamps, war-savings stamps and Liberty Bonds, and we bankers must buy certificates of indebtedness or else the Government cannot buy them. Indications are that we must have more than the support of the banks—we need the support of every man in the bank. If we permit the next Liberty Loan to be issued as a nation, we have lost the game. We understand that the better."

With this yarn, the men behind the bars propose to turn out thousands of socks, sweaters, scarfs and other articles every week for the men in the trenches and turrets. The prison's unused mill-power, already furnished by the Red Cross with many war-aid articles, such as socks, knitting needles and handbags, but the output can be multiplied many times over, according to Warden McKenty, if the public will cooperate with the convicts.
