

OUR HUN PLANES DOWNED AT PARIS

Teuton Airmen Punished When 60 Machines Attack French Capital

U. S. WAR CHIEFS THERE

Berlin (via London), March 12.—Paris was successfully bombed in retaliation for enemy air attacks Saturday and Sunday on Stuttgart, Kallinger, Entenriehheim and Metz, the German War Office announced today.

Paris, March 12.—Four German airplanes were brought down in last night's air raid over Paris. It was officially announced today. No report was made regarding the results of the bombing.

The raid and the fights in the air between French and German airplanes formed a thrilling scene for the American Secretary of War, Newton D. Baker, who had only arrived here yesterday morning and was spending his first night in the French capital.
