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RUSSIA'S SALVATION DEPENDS UPON COSSACKS, SAYS EVA ZAINTZ "BATTALION OF DEATH" PRIVATE

With a Leader Like Kosciuszko the Dons Could Reclaim the Great Land for the Allies

Kerensky Was Disappointment to Cossacks Who Would Have Followed a Real Leader

The history of my family is something which even Russians regarded as unique. For as I have said, I am a Jewess and my father and mother were Jews of the orthodox belief.

Our home was a fine home in the principal street of Taganrog, and the old people who came to live with my father and mother were of the great-grandfather, who was a small merchant when the town was but a village.

I can speak of my own knowledge when I tell what the Cossacks mean to Russia today—and I say that upon them depends Russia's salvation, if that is ever to be accomplished.

NEW COSSACK TOWNS

Since long before my great-grandfather carried his pack of merchandise to the country of the Donski, the government of the Cossacks had been established according to its own ordinances and customs.

Every Cossack has his own farm. The Government provides the land and gives every man all the necessities of an easy life for himself and his family.

So the Cossacks lived from the time of Peter the Great to the time of this war. In childhood the training for the soldier's life was given to every boy.

For a time I hated the Cossacks—and the people about me, whom I saw and who were sent to play and drive the heeds with their lances, wherever revolutionary meetings were held.

himself that lost to him the great strength which was thus offered to his hand.

Disappointed in Kerensky, the Cossacks spurned a weaker authority and returned to receive orders from their Hetman, Kaledines, was a true patriot.

One thing, however, is certain: The Cossacks will never allow the Bolsheviki to govern them—or any branch of the Bolsheviki. They will rule themselves until the people rule Russia in a government which is strong and just.

My father was a man of such influence in Taganrog that he could do anything he wished to do.

EFFECT OF PROHIBITION

The first disturbance of these enviable conditions came when the sale of vodka was prohibited, at the very beginning of the war.

Then, when the struggle to build a strong and effective government for Russia was in progress, the Cossacks at a great meeting announced their obligations of neutrality and declared their loyalty to Kerensky.

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COAL SHORTAGE WORST OF ALL

Then came the worst trouble of the shortage of coal. When I think of that my heart bleeds for the people.

There was no heat for the shops and they were closed as that the people were penniless and suffering.

During all this time, every day, the German airplanes from the Turkish front passed over the town.

That was the Taganrog I left to join the Battalion of Death. That was the Russia whence sprang the Battalion of Death to become a pitiful, bloody blot on Russia's history.
