POSITIONS GIVEN 1400

Thousands Whose Husbands Are at War Will Be Made Self-Supporting

For the first time in the history of the city a census is being taken of women residents over the age of sixteen years. And the work is being done by women. Furthermore, the Government will not have to pay a cent in high salaries or for enormous printing and stationary bills, for the women engaged in this great task are donating their services. Ten Thousand Registered

To date 10,000 women have voluntarily registered. It is to enroll the thousands of women who have not yet signed reg-istration cards that the women's com-mittee is bending every effort. An ormittee is bending every effort. An organization is being built up that will
cover every nook and corner of the city.

The purpose of this registration is, in
a word, to take care of women made
dependent through the cailing to the
cofors of sons, husbands, fathers or
other men on whom they were formerly
dependent. In registering women state
phat kind of work, if any, they can perform and whether or not they are demendent on their own labor for support. pendent on their own labor for support.

If they have no trade or profession,
they are asked to designate what service
they would like to enter.

This registration, it is hoped, will be

the answer to the problem confronting the nation of what shall become of women made dependent by the war Before the end of the war it is expected that these women will number many thousands. It is pointed out that such an army of dependent women would constitute a serious problem.

Positions Given 1100

Already through the efforts of the registration organization 1400 women and girls have received positions. quietly has this work gone forward that the extent and importance of it have been but little understood and less appreciated. Those in charge of the work are confident they can give positions to all women who will sign these cards and make known their wants and what pervice, if any, they are able to per-form.

In this connection it is urged that employers of labor and any persons who can use woman in any capacity that will enable them to become self-supporting wholly or in part give their names and addresses and requirements to the Na-tional Council headquarters, 1607 Wainut street.

Women whose relatives have gone to the front and who are not dependent on them for support are urged to voluntee

for work during the absence of their soldier relatives.

Women working on the city registra-tion report that they have already found evidences of German anti-registration propaganda. Some women visited refused to sign registration cards, say-ing they had been told such registration would enable the Government to conwould enable the Government to con-script them for labor or service even at the front. This, it is said, is absolutely false. The registration seeks to help in-stead of to work a hardship on women. It is also reported that the greatest It is also reported that the greatest difficulty is being experienced in regis-tering women of means. These ap-parently resent what they call an "in-trusion into" their homes and refuse to sign cards. One woman, in a very lthy home in the central section of the city, is said to have made very bitter statements against the draft, say-ing that her husband had been drafted and that she would not sign a card for any kind of Government work.

Registrars Well Received

As a rule, however, the woman registrars report only the best kind of treatment at the hands of women resi-dents. Many women do not seem to under-

stand the nature of the registration required of them. One woman refused to register until it was explained that the action would give employment to herself and her daughters. Another woman, self and her daughters. Another woman, when asked what kind of work she could do, said she had, before her marriage, worked as a manufacturer of children's toys. As this industry is one plach is being rapidly developed in this seunitry, owing to the cutting off of the toy supplies from abroad, the services of this woman will be eagerly sought any firms handling this product. It is because women do not know where to turn in an emergency of this kind that the city registration is being made.

Much assistance is being rendered in performing this task by captains of Girl Scout troops, who are making a house-to-house canvass in various sections of the city.
