

OLGA DORFNER WILL TRY TO WREST CROWN FROM CLAIRE GALLIGAN

OLGA DORFNER WILL COMPETE IN NATIONAL A. A. U. 500-YARD RACE TOMORROW AT DETROIT A. C.

Local Mermaid Will Meet Claire Galligan, Charlotte Boyle and Thelma Darby in Titular Indoor Event in Western Pool

WITH four of the greatest mermaids of the country entered—Olga Dorfner, of the Philadelphia Turgenzende; Charlotte Boyle and Claire Galligan, of New York, and Thelma Darby, the fourteen-year-old wonder of Indianapolis—the National Amateur Athletic Union indoor 500-yard free style championship swim tomorrow in the pool of the Detroit Athletic Club will undoubtedly be the greatest women's aquatic race ever held in this country.

This will be the first of the series of title swims to determine the national championships at the various distances. Following tomorrow's event will come the 100-yard swim, to be staged in Chicago next Saturday. New York will have the honor of staging the 200-yard dash, the following week-end, while the 500-yard titular event will be contested in San Francisco one week later. The 400-yard relay race hasn't been awarded thus far, but as the quartet representing the Philadelphia Turgenzende is the fastest in the country, it is likely that the event may be held in this city.

Lone Quaker City Entry

Miss Olga Dorfner, the lone entry from this city of Brotherly Love, left late Wednesday afternoon, accompanied by her mother, for Detroit, while Miss Claire Galligan and Miss Charlotte Boyle bid adieu to their friends in the big city yesterday afternoon and are expected to arrive in Detroit some time today.

Miss Galligan is the present holder of the 500-yard record of 7 minutes 21 1/2 seconds, established September 30, 1917, at Idora Park, Oakland, Cal. This is only one of the several records which are held by Miss Galligan, as she reigns supreme at all distances from the 100-yard to the one-mile mark.

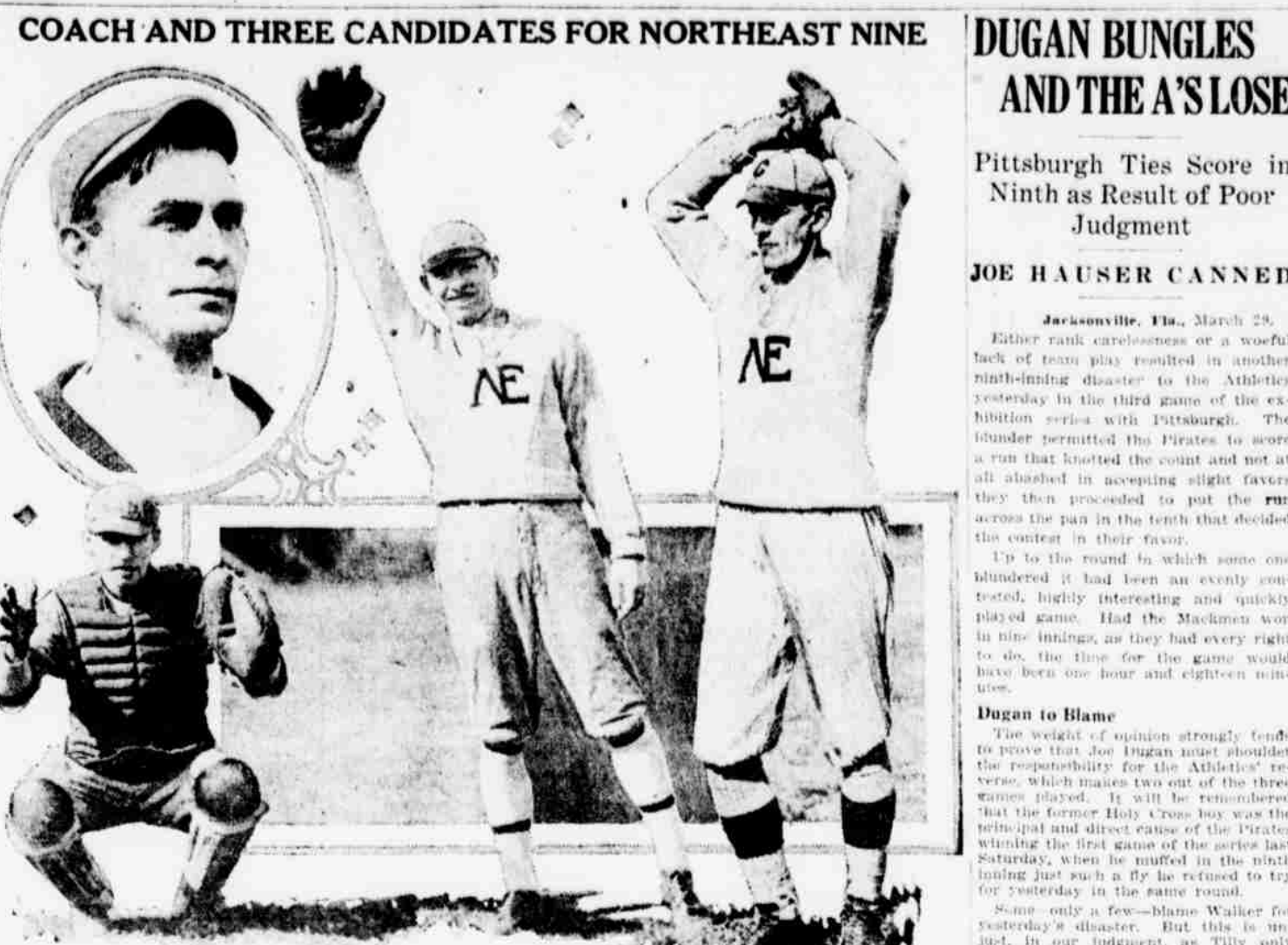
Although Miss Galligan is the record-holder and a slight favorite, it is the opinion of many swimming critics that Miss Dorfner will lower her colors, even though the local entrant is much better at shorter distances. These two great exponents of swimming have never met in a race, so Detroit aquatic fans will have the opportunity of witnessing what the entire country has been awaiting.

Supreme in Sprints Miss Dorfner has no rival in the sprints where turns are required. She uses an excellent crawl stroke and gains many feet by the turns. She holds all American women's sprint records up to 200 yards, and has won the 40 yards in 22 1/2 seconds, 50 yards in 29 seconds, 100 yards in 1:08 1/2, and 150 yards in 1:56 1/2. Last year she won the 50 and 100 yard national women's championships.

As an all-around swimmer Miss Claire Galligan, of New Rochelle, is without a peer among the American mermaids at all distances from 200 yards up. She won the 100 yard race in 29 1/2 seconds and has made some remarkable times, 8 m. of her marks follow:

One hundred yards in 1:09; 200 yards in 2:04 1/2; 500 yards in 4:44; 400 yards in 7:02; 1000 yards in 8:52; 1500 yards in 12:15; 2000 yards in 13:15; 2500 yards in 14:15; 3000 yards in 15:15; 3500 yards in 16:15; 4000 yards in 17:15; 4500 yards in 18:15; 5000 yards in 19:15.

Young Miss Thelma Darby, the fourteen-year-old wonder from Indianapolis, won Miss Charlotte Boyle recently Bay swim record-breaking speed. The former a short time ago was credited with equalling Miss Dorfner's fifty-yard record and Miss Boyle recently defeated Miss Galligan in a fifty-yard dash.
